The Liturgy of the Word

THE HEBREW SCRIPTURES

Exodus 3:1-15

Moses was keeping the flock of his father-in-law Jethro, the priest of Midian; he led his flock beyond the wilderness, and came to Horeb, the mountain of God. There the angel of the LORD appeared to him in a flame of fire out of a bush; he looked, and the bush was blazing, yet it was not consumed. Then Moses said, "I must turn aside and look at this great sight, and see why the bush is not burned up." When the LORD saw that he had turned aside to see, God called to him out of the bush, "Moses, Moses!" And he said, "Here I am." Then he said, "Come no closer! Remove the sandals from your feet, for the place on which you are standing is holy ground." He said further, "I am the God of your father, the God of Abraham, the God of Isaac, and the God of Jacob." And Moses hid his face, for he was afraid to look at God.

Then the LORD said, “I have observed the misery of my people who are in Egypt; I have heard their cry on account of their taskmasters. Indeed, I know their sufferings, and I have come down to deliver them from the Egyptians, and to bring them up out of that land to a good and broad land, a land flowing with milk

and honey, to the country of the Canaanites, the Hittites, the Amorites, the Perizzites, the Hivites, and the Jebusites. The cry of the Israelites has now come to me; I have also seen how the Egyptians oppress them. So come, I will send you to Pharaoh to bring my people, the Israelites, out of Egypt." But Moses said to God, "Who am I that I should go to Pharaoh, and bring the Israelites out of Egypt?" He said, "I will be with you; and this shall be the sign for you that it is I who sent you: when you have brought the people out of Egypt, you shall worship God on this mountain."

But Moses said to God, "If I come to the Israelites and say to them, 'The God of your ancestors has sent me to you,' and they ask me, 'What is his name?' what shall I say to them?" God said to Moses, "I AM WHO I AM." He said further, "Thus you shall say to the Israelites, 'I AM has sent me to you.'" God also said to Moses, "Thus you shall say to the Israelites, 'The LORD, the God of your ancestors, the God of Abraham, the God of Isaac, and the God of Jacob, has sent me to you':

THE CHRISTIAN SCRIPTURES

I Corinthians 10:1-13

A reading from Paul's first letter to the Corinthians.

I do not want you to be unaware, brothers and sisters, that our ancestors were all under the cloud, and all passed through the sea, and all were baptized into Moses in the cloud and in the sea, and all ate the same spiritual food, and all drank the same spiritual drink. For they drank from the spiritual rock that followed them, and the rock was Christ. Nevertheless, God was not pleased with most of them, and they were struck down in the wilderness.

Now these things occurred as examples for us, so that we might not desire evil as they did. Do not become idolaters as some of them did; as it is written, "The people sat down to eat and drink, and they rose up to play." We must not indulge in sexual immorality as some of them did, and twenty-three thousand fell in a single day. We must not put Christ to the test, as some of them did, and were destroyed by serpents. And do not complain as some of them did, and were destroyed by the destroyer. These things happened to them to serve as an example, and they were written down to instruct us, on whom the ends of the ages have come. So if you think you are standing, watch out that you do not fall. No testing has overtaken you that is not common to everyone. God is faithful, and he will not let you be tested beyond your strength, but with the testing he will also provide the way out so that you may be able to endure it.

MARCH GIVING-2-OTHERS

Casa De Paz is the recipient of all Giving-2-Others donations during the month of March. The agency uses volunteers to welcome newcomers, asylum seekers, and immigrants who have been released from the Aurora ICE detention facility. Upon their release, people are offered healthy meals, access to telephones and computers, clothing and hygiene items; this supports their reunification with loved ones. Casa De Paz also offers encouragement and support by writing to people currently in detention. They also provide monetary support to purchase items from the commissary and make phone calls.

The need is especially great at this time, given the situation for immigrants in our country. They rely on donations to help them stay in touch with their families and to purchase small necessities while detained. CFCU includes about 60 Jewish, Protestant, Episcopal, and Catholic congregations statewide which work collaboratively with national gun control organizations in public education and advocacy, passing legislation (i.e. 'red flag' laws), providing victim support and working with at-risk youth. Ms. Fleetwood will summarize the mission and describe the accomplishments of CFCU over the past ten years and invite discussion regarding various ways that St. Barnabas parishioners can become involved in their areas of interest. John Graves and Ruth Pidick are currently the representatives from St. Barnabas. Hope to see you all there!"

Safeguard American Voter Eligibility

The Safeguard American Voter Eligibility (SAVE) Act (H.R.22/S.128) was introduced early in this session of Congress. This legislation would require voters to present citizenship documentation in person to register to vote, would restrict voting rights through unreasonable barriers that will fall most heavily on marginalized communities. Please tell your members of Congress to reject the SAVE Act.
