

THE HEBREW SCRIPTURES

I Kings 19:15-16, 19-21

A reading from the first book of Kings

The Lord said to Elijah, "Go, return on your way to the wilderness of Damascus; when you arrive, you shall anoint Hazael as king over Aram. Also you shall anoint Jehu son of Nimshi as king over Israel; and you shall anoint Elisha son of Shaphat of Abel-meholah as prophet in your place."

So he set out from there, and found Elisha son of Shaphat, who was plowing. There were twelve yoke of oxen ahead of him, and he was with the twelfth. Elijah passed by him and threw his mantle over him. He left the oxen, ran after Elijah, and said, "Let me kiss my father and my mother, and then I will follow you." Then Elijah said to him, "Go back again; for what have I done to you?" He returned from following him, took the yoke of oxen, and slaughtered them; using the equipment from the oxen, he boiled their flesh, and gave it to the people, and they ate. Then he set out and followed Elijah, and became his servant.



the Wisdom from on high by whom you created all things.


You laid the foundations of the world and enclosed the sea when it burst out from the womb;

Giver of Life, draw us together in the Body of Christ, and in the fullness of time gather us with blessed Barnabas and all your people into the joy of our true eternal home.


Through Christ and with Christ and in Christ, by the inspiration of your Holy Spirit, we worship you our God and Creator in voices of unending praise.

Blessed are you now and for ever. AMEN.


The Lord's Prayer

When you have received the Sacrament, please return to your seat. If you or your children prefer only to receive a blessing, please indicate this by crossing your hands over your chest.



SUPPORT ENDANGERED UNACCOMPANIED IMMIGRANT CHILDREN

Unaccompanied children arrive at the US border without their parents or legal guardians. The Department of Health and Human Services' Office of Refugee Resettlement (ORR) cares for unaccompanied children until they can safely reunify with their family. ORR has now merged with the Department of Homeland Security (DHS), essentially converting the agency into another enforcement arm for ICE.
