- Prior to becoming a resident, David volunteered at The Boston Home to help bring new adaptive technologies to benefit residents, including much of the design and innovation here at The Boston Home Cyber Café.
- As a resident of The Boston Home, David has been a valuable mentor to MIT students, sharing his expertise, skills and ideas in support of their research.
- David has been an active member of the Resident Council and an ardent supporter
 of all of those involved with The Boston Home staff, leaders, volunteers and his
 fellow residents.
