POSTINGS FROM FATHER PETER

Today finds us at the beginning of the month of April — an April we never would have expected would have looked like this when March began! Certainly we find ourselves in a very unique situation for all of us — I was reminded of that when the Archbishop recently wrote in one of his letters to priests that none of us has ever found ourselves in a situation like this before. It is very true. I have been a priest for fifteen years now and have never found myself in a situation like this, and, of course, that is true for everyone who is reading this note right now. So, we find ourselves all working to do the best we can in an unexpected situation — in a situation none of us is familiar with and that most, if not all of us, were never trained for.

I wish I could write and say, ‘we’re almost through this, just a few more days!’ but, as it is, I can’t. In fact, at the risk of sounding particularly discouraging, I do not believe that this will be over in a matter of a few days and probably not even for a few weeks — this is what reality is going to look like for the foreseeable future and so I want to propose three particularly important things we need to keep in mind as we go through this together. So how can we make it through this situation, and not only make it through it, but come out stronger on the other side? I want to propose three “P’s” that can guide us and that should direct us over these coming weeks:

- **Perseverance** — The root of the word “perseverance” comes from the idea of getting through something that is difficult. No one can deny that we are facing something difficult — and perseverance is a virtue which we would do well to cultivate. It can be dangerous to think all the time, “well, if only this were to happen...” or “if only this would change...” or “when will this be over?” When we think like that we find ourselves becoming overwhelmed with anxiety — we try to live in a world that is not the one we currently live in, and the result is frustration and all that flows from it. There is that old saying, “one day at a time.” That’s the disposition of one who is working to persevere, they see in the reality they face, the hand of God Himself at work, and so, rather than rejecting it, wishing it to be different, or just trying to get it over with, they accept it and with His strength don’t just “get through it” but actually grow stronger through it. We need to persevere.
- **Patience** — We become impatient when things or people or situations do not go as we would like them to go or when a situation is outside of our control. The impatient person will also be the person who finds themselves becoming miserable internally and showering that misery on other people through impatient actions, words or criticisms. The patient person is able to recognize that life isn’t always the way they want it to be and to accept that. There is a level of acceptance of things that the patient person has which helps them to endure

BAPTISM PREPARATION

Children ages 6 and under: Those seeking to have children baptized should be registered, active members of St. Mary's Visitation Parish. Parents who request baptism for a child are expected to complete a preparation class. It is offered bi-monthly. The scheduled classes for 2020 include:

Saturday, July 11th from 10:30-11:30am in church

It is generally easier if the preparation is done before the birth of the child. If you have attended a session within the last five years, it is not necessary to retake the class. and to do it with grace and dignity. In that sense, patience and perseverance are tied closely together. Perseverance helps one to get through difficulties and patience helps them to do it calmly. Patience is a gift of the Holy Spirit and so we need to ask Him to give us that patience right now — patience with the way things are, patience with each other, and patience with ourselves.

- **Prayer** — Being able to persevere and to do so patiently requires prayer. I believe, firmly — from the depths of my heart — that God is asking us to pray more. We are at a fork in the road here — will this situation move us closer to God or not? We will have to decide. I encourage you to add more prayer to your life and to your family life. Begin and end each day with a prayer, make a visit to church at the times it is open, go to confession, pray the rosary, pick out a family penance that you do weekly (such as no electronics outside of school one day a week, or meatless Fridays even after Lent, etc.) Pray for one another, pray for our leaders, pray for our health care professionals, pray for those who are suffering or dying, pray for the forgiveness of our sins, pray that God may take up His rightful place in our lives, pray that we don't complain, pray that we never take things for granted again, pray that we become better and more faithful people through this, pray for the virtues we need right now. Prayer digs a deep well in our heart, from which we can draw up the life-giving waters of grace that can sustain us in difficult and trying circumstances. God is asking us to dig our wells deeper.

So, perhaps these three "P's" are the things we can keep in front of us right now to help us not only get through this, but to grow through them and come out on the other side of it stronger — stronger in our family ties, stronger in our love for others, stronger in our fidelity to God — Perseverance, Patience and Prayer. I am praying for all of you regularly, please know that in your hearts and may God, in His mercy, sustain and protect us.

PARISH OFFICES REMAIN CLOSED


The St. Mary's Visitation Parish Offices remain closed. The parish staff will check voicemail messages from home and will also be available via e-mail. Thank you for your understanding.
