Locating Civil War Records

Civil War soldiers often left a rich genealogical paper trail. Many of these records are tucked away at the National Archives in Washington DC. Learn what records are available for your ancestors only at the National Archives, what records are online already, and how to access all of them. These records may unlock some of the family stories that have been forgotten over time, as well as break down a brick wall or two!

United States Marshals Museum Opens

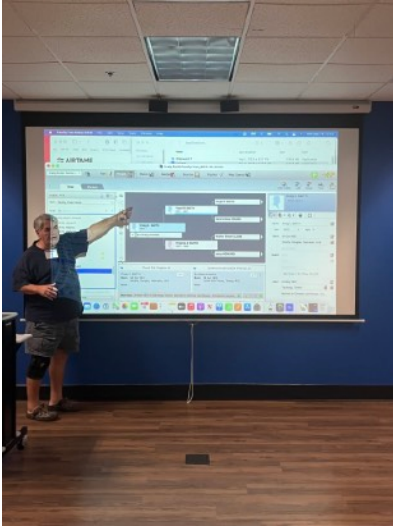

The United States Marshals Museum opened July 1 in Fort Smith, Arkansas. I attended the United States Marshals Service annual meeting which was held at the museum September 10-14. I have been researching the US Marshals since 1985 and wrote my doctoral dissertation on their role in civil disturbances in American history. I also wrote several teaching units. I donated materials from the late United States Marshal Lee Koury from Missouri (1981-1991). The museum put together an interactive exhibit on one of his international extraditions.

The museum has a research library that includes Ancestry. This helps you find out if you are related to a United States Marshal.

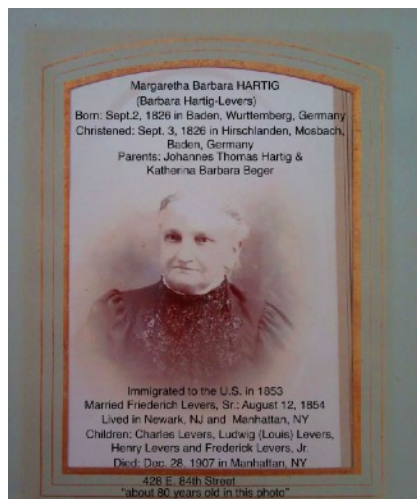

Lenore Levers' Gold Coins by Claire Desmond-Ward



In her Journal, my Great Aunt Lenore Levers (1897-1988) shared a melancholy story from her childhood which occurred in 1907. In his Will (1893), Lenore's father had left \$5,000. to his granddaughter Rosa Levers "the daughter of his deceased son Henry".

When the time came to pay the inheritance (1907), my Great Aunt's and her sister's savings were used for the payment. They were 10 years and 13 years old!

My Great Aunt stated that Rosa and her mother (Caroline) lived "on the wrong side of the tracks and were not welcome in our house...there was much mystery and hush-hush about that part of the family." She wrote that "perfectly strange people wound up with the inheritance."

I began to research the backstory. Who were these relatives? What could I learn about Rosa Levers? Who were Rosa's parents? Were they really "perfectly strange people"? Why was the children's money used to pay the inheritance? What is the value of \$5,000. today?

Some facts that I did know were that Lenore and her sister lived with their parents Marie and Friedrich Levers, Sr. at 428 E. 84th Street in Manhattan. When Lenore and her sister were children, they "received \$2.50, \$5 and \$10 dollar gold pieces as gifts, which were banked".

I learned that Lenore had 3 uncles: Ludwig, Charles and Henry Levers (1857-1878) and all of them had died before Lenore was born. Henry Levers' life was perhaps, full of joy and tragedy...

When Henry was about 19, his girlfriend Caroline Jaiser (1856-1911) became pregnant. Their daughter Barbara Levers was born Sept. 14, 1876 in Manhattan. They named their daughter in honor of Henry's mother Barbara Hartig-Levers. Later, Henry and Caroline were married on Feb. 22, 1877 in Manhattan. Henry was 21 and Caroline was 20. On July 13, 1877 baby Barbara died at the age of 10 months. She was buried on July 16.

Henry died the following month on September 16, 1878 (cause of death unknown). Caroline became a widow at age of 22. However, one month later, Caroline gave birth to another baby named Rosa H. Levers (October 1878). (Note: Rosa would be Lenore's cousin.) Caroline Jaiser-Levers and her daughter Rosa moved home to live with her parents. Caroline's occupation was "dressmaker".

On July 16, 1880, Caroline married George Frederick Palmer. Caroline and George had 4 children named Blanche, George, Frederick, and Magdalene. Some documents, show Rosa H. Levers with the surname Palmer.

An unsupported detail on a genealogy website states that in 1895 George Palmer was "murdered in New York." I have not located supporting details.

Lenore Levers' Gold Coins Continued

Lenore's father, Friedrich Levers, Sr., died in 1893. The directives in his Will would be carried out upon the death of his wife Barbara Hartig-Levers. In 1907, 14 years later, Barbara died of pneumonia and \$5,000. was needed to pay Rosa.

Lenore wrote "As I recall the amount of cash was not available without selling some property so Sis' and my bank accounts were used among other funds."

So adding to some existing funds, Lenore's and her sister's gold coins were cashed in and the money was raised and given to Rosa Levers Jaiser Palmer. The children's savings were wiped out! The value of that \$5,000. from 1907-2023 is equivalent in purchasing power to about \$163,311.70. Rosa died on March 23, 1909 only 2 years after receiving her inheritance. She died from "Tuberculosis Pulmonena" at age 31. Rosa's mother Caroline died two years later on June 22, 1911. Caroline's address was 330 E. 53rd St., NYC (1910 US Fed Census).

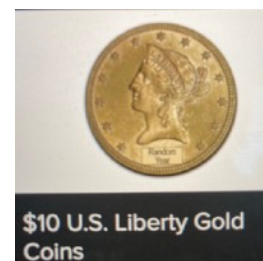
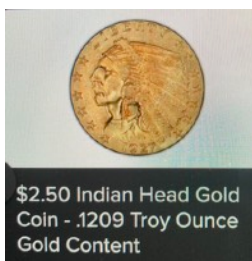
It is true that "perfectly strange people wound up with the inheritance." Those people would be Rosa's half-siblings.

After their mother's death, Blanche, George, Frederick and Magdalene pursued their mother's inheritance. There may have been contentious sibling rivalry for whatever money was left; the legal documents are available but would need explanation, so I will not comment. I can understand why my Great Aunt's family did not maintain friendship nor contact with Caroline's family. It is a melancholy

The basis of this anecdote was recorded in Lenore Levers' Journal (written about 1979). The information provided in this story was researched and collaborated by Claire Desmond-Ward.

My intention was provide data to support what is known about Henry Levers. Some documents were not located after dedicated research. All the research was done to the best of my ability. Please

On almost every genealogy type TV show, you'll note, starts with the genealogist saying to the client, "Let's look at the Federal Census!"

Censuses are filled with valuable information which initially may be overlooked. We will review the importance and meaning of this data.

However, the information on the census record is only as good as

1. What the informant provided
2. Who provided the information
3. The answers versus the instructions
4. What the Enumerator understood or was there a communication problem
5. The census record being legible

Also consider that some census records are missing or deliberately erroneous.
