To the Readers of 2C1C from Vern Wells, President of the Monmouth-Independence Community Foundation :

Monmouth and Independence recently lost a truly great community supporter, an erudite author, a dedicated historian, and a good friend, Scott McArthur.

He was a long-time resident of Monmouth, retiring after many years of practice as an attorney from his office on Atwater Street. His legal acumen as a lawyer made McArthur a formidable opponent in the court room.

One of the many treasures Scott gifted our community was the establishment of the Monmouth-Independence Community Foundation. Scott had started the Education Charitable Trust scholarship program in 1995. Then in May of 2000, along with Don Duncan and James Epple, he created the Monmouth Independence Community Foundation. Originally there was only enough money for one or two small scholarships. But from those humble beginnings, Scott and his compatriots established an organization that now manages over \$2M in investments through



collaboration with many community partners. The Community Foundation has awarded tens of thousands of dollars in local grants through its school-based programs and scholarships. Scott's vision and leadership of the Community Foundation is one of his greatest and most meaningful legacies.

Scott was a traveler. He enjoyed visiting county fairs around the country and sampling a variety of cuisines. Cruising was also a favorite.

An early grounding in journalism helped him become a fine author, and Scott wrote several excellent books to tell the history and stories of his hometown and county. He was a regular guest speaker at the Polk County Museum, and a regular contributor to the Itemizer Observer, sharing his charming tales of "the old days".

Scott was a member of the Masonic Lodge in Independence and held the group in high regard. For a long time, Scott oversaw post-meeting refreshments. His menu was always unique, and he served is lodge brothers everything from alligator stew to rocky mountain oysters.

Scott was also involved in the Masons' long-standing scholarship program and in their ardent support of reading activities in several area schools.

Scott McArthur's loss will be felt long and hard. We who knew him will always be proud of our friendship with him and will feel compassion for those who were not lucky enough to have interacted with Scott.

DID YOU KNOW??

SEPTEMBER 19 is INTERNATIONAL TALK LIKE A PIRATE DAY!

This parodic holiday was created in 1995 by John Baur (Ol' Chumbucket) and Mark Summers (Cap'n Slappy), of Albany, Oregon!

An observer of this holiday would greet friends not with "Hello, everyone!" but with "Ahoy, maties!" or "Ahoy, me hearties!" The holiday, and its observance, springs from a romanticized view of the Golden Age of Piracy.

At first an inside joke between two friends, the holiday gained exposure when Baur and Summers sent a letter about their invented holiday to the American syndicated humor columnist Dave Barry in 2002. Barry liked the idea and promoted the day.

Growing media coverage of the holiday after Barry's column has ensured that this event is now celebrated internationally, and Baur and Summers now sell books and T-shirts related to the theme on their website.

The association of pirates with peglegs, parrots, and treasure maps, popularized in Robert Louis Stevenson's novel Treasure Island (1883), has had a significant influence on parody pirate culture. Talk Like a Pirate Day is now celebrated in many different ways around the world.

FUN TRIVIA FACTS ABOUT SCHOOLS IN INDEPENDENCE



Mrs. Thomas Burbank was the first school teacher in Independence, her school being a tiny log cabin that was formerly a home and located on the north side of town. The school started about 1852-53.



A school, taught by Alonzo Gesner, was organized in a vacant saloon about 1865-66.



On Monday, February 9th, 1891 the public school was opened in a fine new building just completed by the Independence District.



Al W. McAdams was the first principal of the new school, followed by Mrs. L.W. McAdams, Miss Carry Fowle, Miss Hattie Hays, Mill Ella Shupp, Mrs. F.L. Tuck and Mrs. F. Gates as the new teachers.



The "Trades Carnival" was given in honor of the completion of the eight room school house which would hold children from the consolidated districts #38 and #29. It was held in the new Opera House in 1890 and symbolized the end of this decade. To quote from the Westside newspaper about the Trades Carnival:

"At 8:15 through the open doorway came filing 41 young ladies, representing the several trades and professions of the city of Independence. It was a royal company, and as they marched through the hall, an excellent opportunity was offered to viewers of the ladies who regardless of expense were advertising the wares of the firms they represented. Miss Miller representing the electric light company stepped forward and suddenly was enveloped in a flood of light from incandescent lamps fastened to her clothing and on the banner. The audience was so enthusiastic that a recall was necessary."



On June 17th, 1917 the school district voted to enter into a contract with the Oregon Normal School permitting its school to become a training school. On June 1st, 1925 the school board voted to deed block 19 of Henry Hill's town of Independence to the state for a new training school.



High school was inaugurated in 1891 with a two year course and was increased to the four year course by a vote of the directors in 1910, the same year in which the high school building was erected.

They can also be used as a centerpiece in any open spaces that need "something". All are original designs waiting for a place to call home.

New Work Infrared Photographs by Rich Bergeman

River Gallery

This is a collection of favorite recent images, all but two made this year (the exceptions are from 2019), and all made with digital cameras converted to record infrared wavelengths. I've grown to love looking at the world through this hauntingly beautiful range of light. And I love the challenge of harnessing its more dramatic tendencies in order to create more subtle revelations of the Northwest landscape, like fog-shrouded forest trails and the elegant patterns formed by high-altitude cirrus clouds.

The infrared light range lies just above the visible spectrum--too high for the human eye to see, but it's there just the same. It records vegetation and other organic objects as glowing highlights rather than the middle grays of straight black-and-white photographs, reversing the tonal ranges we're accustomed to seeing (perhaps the best example of that in this show is "Lily Pad Pond").



Infrared transforms the skies overhead as well--on a fair day, the cold blue atmosphere registers as a deep dark value, creating a wonderful canvas for those feathery cirrus clouds as they play across the sky.

The images in this show were made from one end of Oregon to the other; from the Malheur Refuge in the High Desert country to Cascade Head and Astoria on the coast. Two photographs were made right here in beautiful downtown Independence--"Daylight Moon Over the Willamette" and "View From the Land of the Luckiamute Kalapuya."

Message From Representative Paul Evans, House District 20:

Though it is hard to believe, September is here. There are three items I believe we must keep our eyes on: the continuing COVID-19 contagion, what we have accomplished and are working on regarding wildfires, and finally the upcoming reapportionment/redistricting process.

First, 2021 has been a bit of a rollercoaster with the emergence of the "Delta Variant" of COVID-19. We are back to wearing masks inside and outside (in most

places), social distancing, and focusing upon vaccination for those who remain unvaccinated. It appears we couldn't quite reach real-world "herd immunity" (at least yet), but together we can get there if we choose to. The recent FDA approval of the Pfizer Vaccine should help provide some of the folks with lingering concerns at least a little greater certainty about the safety of the vaccine.

Second, in addition to our efforts to mitigate COVID-19 spread, we are also engaged in the most challenging fire season in Oregon history. More than 600,000 acres have already burned -- before Labor Day. Our investments over the past year are bearing fruit in terms of added firefighters and prevention measures: the fires this year could have been much worse. However, we must be ready for the months ahead of us. The weather experts believe we face

very hot, dry, and likely difficult days ahead. Hopefully, the winds will remain calm -yet we must be prepared for the worst.

Finally, we are nearing the end of the initial phase of the reapportionment/ redistricting process. We have had, and continue to have forums (some in person, most virtual) seeking your ideas for the best, fairest, most transparently derived framework for representative legislative and congressional districts. There is still time for your input to be heard (for more information go to Oregonlegislature.gov/ redistricting/). We will be making the final decisions the last week of September in Special Session.

Thank you for the opportunity to serve you as your voice in the Capitol. This is a challenging time and we are in this together -- together we shall navigate the remaining obstacles.
