The main goal of the CCE team was to create relevant and impactful events that raised awareness, encouraged involvement and inspired sustainable change.

What initiatives did you personally participate in or complete that you believe contributed to your individual commitment to sustainability and made a lasting impact?

JB: I played a key role in organizing and promoting Sustainapalooza, a major sustainability celebration on campus. I managed tasks like creating the social media event page, designing promotional materials, recruiting volunteers, and coordinating logistics with partners. I also helped strengthen our social media presence by creating engaging content that educated others on sustainability topics and upcoming events. These

experiences helped me directly impact our campus culture by making sustainability more visible, approachable and exciting for others.

SL: The biggest personal initiative I took part in this year was challenging myself to reduce food waste by meal prepping and composting. By meal prepping and having a plan for groceries, I was able to buy only the ingredients that I needed and not purchase excess things. This not only helped me reduce food waste but also supported my financial sustainability. I also began composting the waste that I produced, allowing it to be reused and repurposed. This initiative will definitely be something I will continue to do in the future.

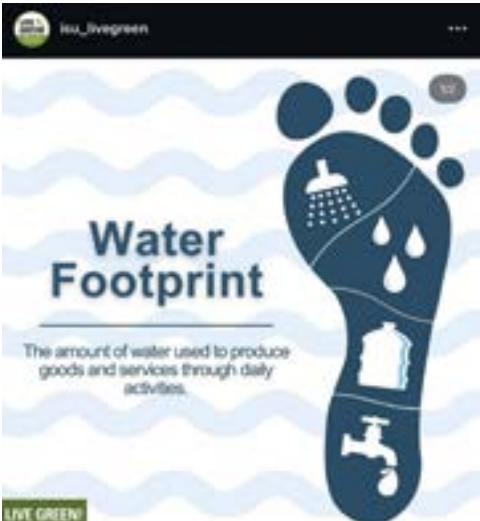

In addition, I assisted in building a sustainability research directory, to highlight the countless research opportunities around campus that were connected to sustainability. I was also a part

of completing annual updates to the Sustainability Course Directory—providing students with a resource they could use to integrate sustainability into their academic portfolios, regardless of their major. The directory included courses from EVERY college on campus — there is truly something for everyone to enjoy!

As passionate sustainability leaders at Iowa State and beyond, the Live Green team showed incredible dedication and effort in advancing sustainability initiatives and leaving a legacy of commitment to environmental, economic and social sustainability.
