Can You Imagine? By Pam Herman

It took me 2 years to work up the courage to see the movie, Mel Gibson's *The Passion of the Christ*. It took me that long to face the violence depicted in the movie depicting Jesus' last hours on earth and the amount of hatred placed on Our Lord.

Surprisingly, the beatings, the lashings, the brutality of the movie wasn't the worst part for me. Oh it was terrible – can you even imagine what it must have felt like to face such utter brutality and the very worst that man has to offer? It didn't take me long to realize watching the movie, that Jesus was dead way before He even touched the cross. He was a dead man walking when He carried His cross to Golgatha.

No the hardest part for me was hearing the words, "Eloi, Eloi, lema sabachthani." Or "My God, My God, why have you forsaken me." I certainly don't know Aramaic, but it was clear – clearer than anything else I've ever heard uttered, that Jesus was in absolute anquish and even harder to hear still was that He felt entirely alone. Entirely alone. He felt far from God's presence and it broke Him. Can you imagine how that must have felt?

Actually, there's no way we could know what it must feel like to be that far from God's presence. The words that Jesus says on the cross were originally uttered by David in Psalm 22. David is feeling far from God because of what is going on in his life. Feeling far from God is the ultimate consequence of his (and our) sin. And Jesus must experience being far from God in order to fully pay the price of our sin. I imagine this is why, in the garden of Gethsemane, that Jesus asked that the cup be passed from him three times. It's one thing to know what you are about to face regarding the physical pain. It's quite another to know you're going to have to face it alone, without your Father, God which is a true spiritual loss.

Can you just imagine what that felt like?

Can You Imagine?


Can you just imagine having your worst day ever and having no one to pray to, to call out to, to feel God's loving presence? To know that you are so far from God, you may never make it back to Him?

And thanks to God's wondrous plan filled with grace and mercy, we never have to know what that feels like. Because Jesus spent time on the cross being far from God's loving presence as He uttered those words, My God, My God, why have you forsaken me, we never have to be far from God. Jesus paid the ultimate price for the ultimate consequence of sin.

And my question to you is: do we truly appreciate the magnitude of Jesus' suffering on the cross the great gift that was given to us –

do we seek God out in our lives the way we should for such a gift?

This Lent and Holy Week, I invite you to take some time to reflect on how far Jesus must have felt from God to utter those words "My God, My God, Why have you forsaken me?" Hear that anguish, feel the heartbreak and remember, He was forsaken so that you won't ever have to be. Jesus gave us the ability to be able to go directly to God in all that we experience, whether it be strife, joy, heartache, frustration, fear, etc. But do we? Or do we act like toddlers saying "I do it," "I'll do it myself!" Let's each one take some time in prayer to bring God into our lives, no matter what's happening, to draw close to Him, and to say thanks for His gift.



Prayer Vigil












Easter Sunday @ St. Paul's UCC

Christian Symbols

Easter Eggs: Although Easter eggs were once part of pagan spring festivals, they've become Christian symbols of new life. A cracked-open shell also represents Jesus' empty tomb on Easter morning. For Lent, some families used to give up eggs and dairy, so they prepared a pancake feast on Shrove Tuesday, the day before Ash Wednesday. They solved the egg surplus by hard-boiling them in various broths, which led to colored eggs. Did you know, each year, the PAAS Dye Co. sells more than 10 million egg-coloring kits, which consumers use to decorate 180 million eggs.

Transformed

Before becoming a Christian late in life, British journalist Malcolm Muggeridge denied that Jesus was God's Son and had risen from the dead. If Jesus' body was missing, he said, someone probably snatched it and abandoned it to the vultures, leaving the bones to whiten in the sun.

For Muggeridge, the turning point was encountering a living Lord. "If you should ask me by what authority I talk about the power of Christ to change human nature, I should reply to you simply ... because he has changed me," Muggeridge said after discarding agnosticism. "I can look anybody in the face today — my friends, my colleagues and what, perhaps, is most difficult of all, the members of my family — and be sure that they know, as I know, that I am really and literally a new creature in Christ Jesus since the day when he came into my life."


