As I write this article, we've just experienced the awesome power of the Holy Spirit at our annual Pentecost Sunday celebration! It was a wonderful day filled with the color red, the wind, great food and finally some fellowship! It was a great day to see the Holy Spirit alive in each of you in worship and at the picnic that followed.

Next, we will celebrate the Holy Trinity on Trinity Sunday, May 30. This is the day we celebrate God in 3 persons – the Father, Son and Holy Spirit. Each a separate entity but all one God.

So, what celebration or season is there following Holy Trinity Sunday? The Sundays after Pentecost which continue until Christ the King Sunday just before the season of Advent. The color for this season of the church is green – for growth and learning.

In the June gospel readings, we have the parable of the mustard seed, Jesus calming the storm, a woman healed by touching Jesus, and Jesus running into resistance in his hometown. Certainly not the big, majestic moments of Pentecost and the Trinity, but everyday events that teach us that we are so very much in need of God, His Grace, and His Son.

These everyday happenings become our mainstay as we begin to get out from under Covid-19 and back to our regular, ordinary lives. Some consider

consider ordinary boring, but in these readings, life is anything but ordinary because there is much to learn from Our Lord. And life is not meant for us as followers of Jesus to be ordinary – it is meant to be extraordinary because of our faith that leads us to the rest of our faith journey.

In this season, you're invited to take time to really read the scripture lessons. Take your Sabbath time to better understand what it is that Jesus is teaching us in these lessons. Ask questions using what if! What if Jesus didn't tell the parable of the mustard seed as a parable – would people still understand the story? What if the woman wasn't able to reach Jesus and what if Jesus didn't confront her – would she continue to be healed? What if Jesus didn't calm the storm, would the

disciples continue to call on Him for help?

You may not get answers to your specific questions, but you'll get to see the lessons from a different perspective. Any way that you can continue to better understand God's Word is always a great way to spend time – one on one time to enjoy with God.

Enjoy your Sabbath time this Summer.

Plans will be available for both kids and adults on the table outside the Sanctuary or on the table just inside the back entrance.

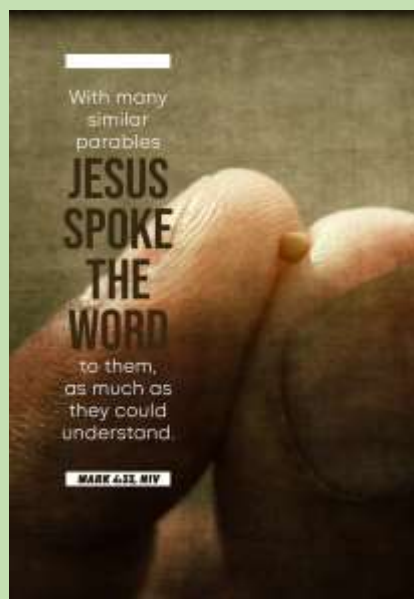

The child attends the Lephohi Centre for the blind, a community-based project in Francistown, Botswana. Covid-19 has impacted that area as well as it has here and our student is studying at home. He sent us a letter dated March 31, 2021 seen below.

Let us be thankful that we have been able to help this student for the last few years and be joyful for his success and being able to tell us about his home and family.

Dear mothers,

Hello over there, how are you? Myself, I'm doing well. I am still doing great and in good health. As you may know I am a visually impaired young man, because of my condition and

how compromised my immune system is, our government has taken a decision that those of us with profound disabilities should remain at home as a way of protecting us from the coronavirus, so since 2020 I have been home with my parents to date.

I hope the situation can change for the better because I miss my friends at school, my house parents, my teachers and studying. Here at home, I keep myself busy by watering my parents' garden, I feed the chickens, and wash dishes. My family members engage me in a lot of activities to keep me busy and I also like helping them out. It is now harvesting season, we eat millies, sweet reeds, sweet potatoes, and watermelons. Thank you for your continuous support dear parents. I value and appreciate you. God bless you.

Council Highlights

Church Council met on Tuesday, May 18 @ 7 pm. Highlights of the meeting include:

Memorial Gifts & Endowment:

Gretchen reported that the endowment fund began the year at a value of \$1.34 million and is currently at \$1.358 million.

Treasurer's Report:

Benevolence: \$1,105 was received for the April mission of the month, the Manheim Central Food Pantry. \$523 from the Lenten offering was sent to Penn Central Conference for Texas Disaster Relief in April. This is in addition to the \$1,434 already sent.

Operating: nothing unusual to report.

Capital: \$3,185 was received in April, expenses totaled \$312.50 for the nursery painting deposit.

Pastor's Report: No report.

Committee Reports: Property Board requested that Council make the final decision re: allowing outside groups to rent church facilities. After some



discussion, council agreed to open to AA and Yoga Class as long as the groups have agreed in writing to our safety guidelines and agree to clean and disinfect after each use.

Upcoming Events: Council discussed possible participation in the Manheim Farm Show. Further discussion is tabled until a future meeting.

The next meeting will be held on Tuesday, June 15 @ 7 pm with Spiritual Council @ 6:30 pm.

Each circle in this symbol represents one of the Persons of the Holy Trinity — the Father, the Son and the Holy Spirit. The circles, having no beginning and no end, signify the Trinity's eternal nature. The circles' interlacing symbolizes unity. In the center is a triangle, an ancient symbol of the Trinity.

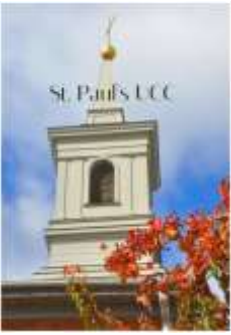
