Let's do a little experiment!

I'm going to pick a random Scripture and as you read it, think about whether you know what it's talking about.

*Do not long for the night,
when peoples vanish in their place.*

²¹ *Take care; do not turn to iniquity,
for this you have chosen rather than affliction.*

²² *Behold, God is exalted in his power;
who is a teacher like him?*

²³ *Who has prescribed for him his way,
or who can say, 'You have done wrong'?*

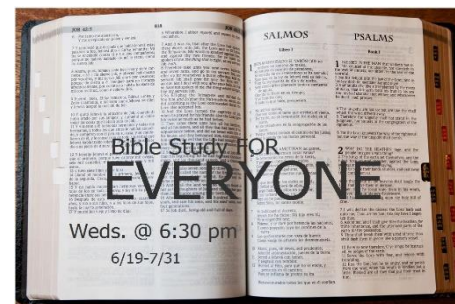
Job 36:21-23

Did you get that? Outside of its context, this passage of Scripture may not seem to make sense or have much relevance. But with a little context, and deeper exploration, we find that this chunk of the Word is the worship, wailing, and wrestling of a man embroiled in spiritual

warfare and turmoil, even though he didn't understand why God was allowing it.

If the above text was confusing to you at first, don't fret! The Bible can be complex and can feel overwhelming. Sometimes it requires us to stand back and view the whole forest, and other times, we need to zoom in on just a tree to harvest God's message. What's amazing about the Bible is that God spoke through roughly 40 authors to write 66 books, penned over thousands of years to bring us a unified, authoritative message, without error, bearing witness to our only Savior Jesus Christ. In the Bible we find not only salvation and forgiveness, but also God's standards for Christian life and righteousness, His plan for eternity, hope and encouragement in hardship, examples of powerful prayer, ancient people with struggles like yours and mine, and rest in the arms and promises of our Heavenly Father.

Sometimes, this isn't so obvious when we briefly read over passages of Scripture on a Sunday morning. But I just want to offer my personal testimony about how the Word of God is literally changing my life!

God's Word in my life:

- Serves as a mirror, challenging me to see my daily sin in light of truth and leads me to make tough, but holy changes.
- Articulates the heart of God for humanity, though I may not understand everything that He allows.
- Shows His purpose for my life and ministry in light of eternity.
- Helps me hear the Holy Spirit and have a relationship with God because I'm learning His voice and character with the Word as my example.
- Equips me with boldness to face the future, because I know how the story ends for believers in Christ Jesus.

And that's just the tip of the iceberg! There's so much more, and this has conceived such a contagious excitement in me that I want to tell everyone who will listen about my Lord and Savior Jesus Christ and how He offers hope to anyone who is poor in spirit. The fingerprints of God's overall authorship left in the details of Scripture show us that the Bible was crafted in love by a perfect God, giving us the confidence to share its truths with others! Isn't that amazing!

Okay, maybe I'm a Bible nerd and perhaps I like picking God's brain a little more than the average person,



but there is an enthusiasm for the Word of God that's growing at St. Paul's and it's happening in our Wednesday Bible Study. This time together in study has allowed us to go deeper into the Word and connect to each other as brothers and sisters in Christ.

Sometimes we discuss tough topics in Bible Study, but the purpose is always accomplished. God's will is articulated and the Holy Spirit does the transforming work in each of our lives. I encourage you, friends, to come and experience how the Lord is moving among us, illuminating His Word in our hearts. Sure, sometimes, God challenges our thinking and our fleshly wants. Together we wrestle, wail, worship, and ultimately surrender to the will of God.

After all, He does tell us to grow in grace and knowledge of our Lord in **2 Peter 3:18**, to be transformed by renewing our thinking in **Romans 12:2**, and to gather together often before He returns for us in **Hebrews 10:25**. So that's what we're doing in Bible study and we want everyone to be part of that.

You may be thinking – "Bible study is really not my thing," or, "I have my own Bible Study group." But I challenge you to come, taste, and see how our good Lord encounters your spirit.

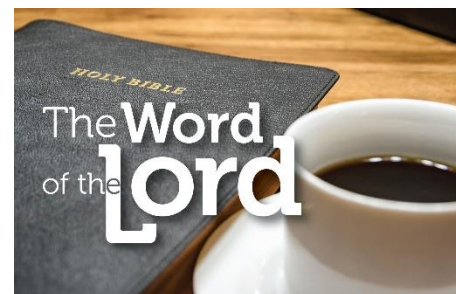

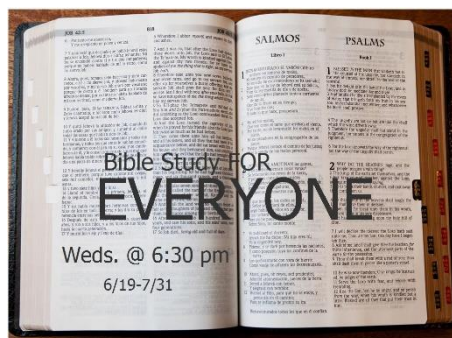

Weighed Down

Many people dream of having the "right stuff" to fly to space. Recently, 18,300 people applied for just 12 astronaut spots at NASA! Fanfare over the moon landing's 50th anniversary is sure to spark even more interest.

Leaving behind earthly troubles and floating in zero gravity must be amazing, right? Not, it turns out, for one's body. Weightlessness takes a heavy physical toll in space. Without resistance, muscles waste away and bones weaken. Bodily systems we take for granted are disrupted, causing disorientation. To counteract these effects, astronauts wear resistance suits while exercising. Ironically, after escaping Earth's gravity, they must replace it.

Similarly, we long for trouble-free days and pray for an end to earthly burdens, not recognizing that exertion, whether physical or

spiritual, builds strength. "He who knows no hardships will know no hardihood," said Harry Emerson Fosdick. "He who faces no calamity will need no courage. ... The characteristics in human nature which we love best grow in a soil with a strong mixture of troubles."

Every weighty challenge is a reason to *"rejoice ... knowing that suffering produces endurance, and endurance produces character, and character produces hope"* (Romans 5:3-4, ESV).

- ♦ Overall, we are running a bit behind both the current fund giving from last year as well as the 2019 budget. This could be due to a large one-time gift given in both 2017 and 2018 that didn't happen this year or the lower 2019 auto withdrawals.

Pastor's Report:

- ♦ Wording for The Covenant of Ministry for Pastor Bill Long was tweaked in preparation of the congregational meeting this Sunday.
- ♦ In the fall, Pastor Bill will be starting a book club for those who might be interested. A possible title to read could include *The Lion, the Witch and the Wardrobe*.

Committee Reports:

- ♦ Property Board – Pam noted that several broken toilet seats have been replaced. Noble Chemical was here to repair the sanitizer in the kitchen sink. Joan addressed parking lot issues – warning signs were distributed to those who have been parking overnight. The plaster in the ceiling above the organ will be repaired either at the end of June or July. Deadbolt locks will be installed in the nursery within the next few weeks for security purposes.

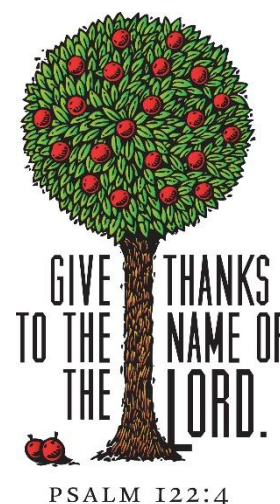

A Day Away in a Quiet Place

Maya Angelou said, *"Each person deserves a day away in which no problems are confronted, no solutions searched for. Each of us needs to withdraw from the cares which will not withdraw from us."* Similarly, when Jesus' disciples were consumed with ministry, he urged them, *"Come with me by yourselves to a quiet place and get some rest"* (Mark 6:31, NIV).

The late days of summer might be just the time to seek "a day away" not only from problems but even from

ministry. While serving God and others can be energizing, we must balance work with rest. God set that example, resting after creating the world; Jesus set that example, calling his disciples away — not just alone, but *with him* — to be refreshed.

Spend a relaxing day at a lake. Go on a scrapbooking retreat or a leisurely hike with a friend. Find a monastery that welcomes guests, and experience 48 hours of prayer and silence there. Invite Jesus into that time and space. And remember another message he shared: *"Come to me, all you who are weary and burdened, and I will give you rest"* (Matthew 11:28, NIV).

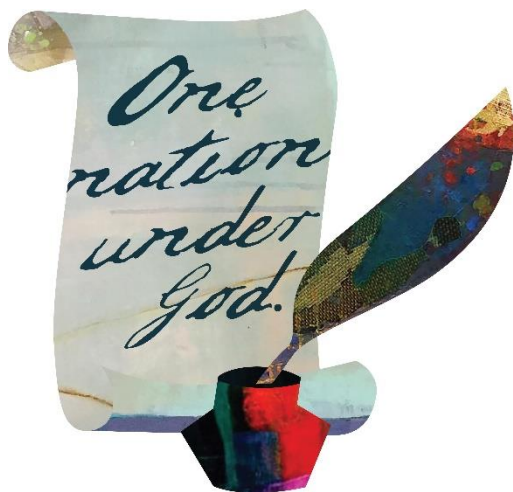
