


Event planning definitely takes a team—and as vice president, I lead those efforts as chair of the Committee on Program eliciting the input, feedback, and assistance of the conference team. Our conference events reflect the work of many officers. According to the United Methodist Women website, the role of the Vice President (aka Program Coordinator) is described as a leader who works cooperatively with the president and assists the conference in fulfilling the Purpose and this is accomplished as the vice president:

- Guides the Leadership Team in its responsibility for planning and implementing program and events to strengthen mission and fulfill the Purpose.
- Serves as contact person for the district program coordination designee or vice presidents, provide resources and conduct training at least annually.

I point these things out because the roles of district officers closely reflect those of their conference counterparts. So, have you been assisting your district vice president? What is your role in event planning? I encourage you to take some time and explore the UMW Handbook for tips for you and your team as we all need to consider how we can fulfill our PURPOSE effectively (the handbook is even accessible at this [link](#) if you don't have a printed copy). Every time I go to it for something, I end up "in a rabbit hole" learning things I "didn't know I didn't know"! Perhaps it will be a helpful resource for you too!

Take a look at the updated 2020 UMW of Indiana Calendar in this newsletter. Despite Mission u being canceled for this summer, UMW North Central Jurisdiction meeting details still pending (but not taking place this month in Sioux Falls), and INUMC Annual Conference having a different look this year, we are pushing forward with plans for this fall's UMW Annual Celebration, the Silent Retreat, and Leadership Development/Officer Training. Why? Well, I like to say we are women of faith and we can proceed with our eyes, ears, and hearts open to however we need to adjust our plans.

I don't think I've ever been prouder of our Indiana Conference UMW team than I was when we met in March. Our team did not meet at Benedict Inn for our March 13-14 meetings—we met via a modern alternative: teleconferencing! About 24 hours before women would be driving to our Indianapolis meeting location, President Kathie and I concluded that we needed to cancel our reservation at the retreat center, setup two conference call lines (since some meetings occur

simultaneously), and inform nearly 50 meeting participants of plan to pivot and connect in a different way: our own scheduled times. So, at 7pm Friday evening, the district presidents “gathered” on one conference call as the Program Committee met on another. At 9am Saturday morning, the Committee on Nominations met on one line while the Finance Committee met on another. Then, the Leadership Team, which includes National President Shannon Priddy, the conference officers, and district presidents met 9-3 with a brief lunch break. Lastly, the Mission u Team “gathered” at 4pm. Did we miss seeing one another? Sure, we missed the fellowship and hugs. However, our meetings were still engaging, lively, and fruitful. We still had work to do---and we did it! The biggest surprise of the weekend for me was when a motion was made, discussed, voted on, and passed unanimously to hold our meetings next March remotely as well! Wow, we

can get creative, and we can be open-minded to try new things when we need to! So, how about getting creative and keeping an open mind when someone has an idea that is different than how we've always done it? It may be a great step forward for UMW!!

We have some great things going on in Indiana UMW, and we may have to come up with creative ways to accomplish these things. During these times, it's important to love and be kind. I remind you of the words of Paul the apostle, in Philippians 2:4, *do not merely look out for your own personal interests, but also for the interests of others.* Sisters, continue your faithful service in ways that may stretch us to be flexible and creative. I know you can if you pivot and don't give up. Let's try new things. Let's do this together...for God's glory.

May we who have the flexibility to care for our children when their schools close remember those who have no options.


May we who have had to cancel our trips remember those who have no place to go.





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Spiritual Growth

Dear Sisters in Christ,

How have you been coping with the 'shelter-in-place' recommendations as well as the daily newscasts with the lead story being the COVID-19 pandemic? And, how is your prayer life? I admit mine has been up and down and all over the place. There are days when I'm full of praise and thanksgiving and intercession, and others when everything is a lament for the city, state, and world – and me. Other times there are just no words. I know God hears the groanings of our hearts and I am so very thankful for that promise.

A few weeks ago I remembered a book I read and the theme of a Silent Retreat a few years back. *Praying in Color – Drawing a New Path to God* by Sybil MacBeth was on our reading list in 2010. When feeling distracted, this book offers a method for working through our frustrations through prayer.

With some colored pencils or markers or crayons; sheets of paper; a list of the names for God; and your doodling skills, you are ready. On your paper – probably in the center, but anywhere is fine, write a name for God. Draw a shape / cloud / blob around this name. Ask God to be a part of your prayer session. Write and/or doodle around your name for God. List the characteristics of this name. Do this through scallops around your shape, or rays – like those that radiate around the sun, or in concentric circles around your shape. You can include words in your description, but they are not necessary. The purpose is to get still on your inside and to listen to God. If names of people "pop-up", write them down on your paper,


allowing space to draw/doodle around each of them. Give yourself 2-3 minutes to spend with God alone.

Next, we want to pray for those people and situations we wrote around the name for God – and more will probably "pop-up". Add them to your page as they do, then go back to the name you are praying for at the time. Take time to draw and color a shape around each name and situation. Often, we are praying for someone we really don't know. Then I remember the verse from Jeremiah – God has a plan and purpose for each person. We just must believe that God knows what He is doing! Again, as you draw / pray, using words in your head or writing them down, draw a design around the name. Add words if you want, but they aren't necessary. We are offering this person or situation into God's care. We are spending time with them and with God by drawing. Repeat this process as often as you need at one time. Each dot, each line, and each stroke of color becomes another moment of time spent with that person in the center, and with God. When your prayer time is complete, you will have a page – or two or three – of family and friends and situations formed into a colorful community of designs on the page. At the end of your prayer time, you may want to say 'Amen'. Keep a notebook of your prayer drawings so you can write the date the prayer was answered.

If you can scribble or draw a lop-sided shape, you can pray in color!

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Education and Interpretation

As Coordinators of Education & Interpretation look at the year ahead, I encourage you all to give yourself grace as we navigate the pandemic and all the ways that is it affecting our lives. I know that I am struggling with moving forward. Our normal tasks would be to share the opportunity of youth, children and first-time adult scholarships for Mission u which has now been canceled.

It is important to continue supporting our local church youth and young adults as they serve in mission service projects. Indiana United Methodist Women have given seven 2020 Scholarships. We have shared with each Youth & Young Adult Scholarship recipient that each group should keep those funds and use later in the year or next year. Until travel is safe again the Youth & Young Adult Scholarship team is suspending new scholarship grants.

As I have read emails from our church youth leaders, most are planning to use their scholarship funds in 2021. Other youth leaders are hopeful that their mission project can continue later in the summer. Rhonda Ladd, Delphi United Methodist Church, shared with me their plans to still be supportive in mission: "I wanted to share with you what we plan on doing for the Jamaicans this year. Christian Service International employs Jamaicans who help build the houses and support the teams going to Jamaica. This year, Delphi UMC has decided to send funds to build one house in our absence."

Some of the ways we can continue to serve:

1. Develop and promote strategies for engaging in and growing Mission Giving at all levels of United Methodist Women; a) Encourage participation with Lucille Raines – Share that Amazon Prime and Kroger have rewards where you may assign a percentage. In-kind and monetary gifts count on Mission Today Report Form; b) Encourage Mission Today Items and, after receiving your report forms from the units, provide the information annually to the Conference Mission Coordinator.
2. Promote and utilize United Methodist Women print, online and audiovisual resources to tell the mission story.

What are you reading? All the extra time at home from COVID-19 has given me an extra chance to read more. It is a perfect time to read some books from the UMW Reading Program list and then use them later for a lesson or program when we get back together in our UMW groups. Many of the books are available in Kindle form too so you can get them online and download them immediately to read. For eBooks free of charge, check your local library, Google eBookstore, Project Gutenberg or Open Library. Also, the Mission u books are available to read even though Mission u is cancelled for this year. This year the current mission studies will count as two books like the bonus books do. Copies of *Pushout* are also available since it will be used next summer also. Don't forget to browse back through the older lists that are posted on the [UMW website Reading Program](#) page. You can continue to read books on the lists from 2014 through 2020 and there are LOTS of good ones! I am currently reading *Blue Gold*, a novel by Elizabeth Stewart, from the 2016 Social Action list. It is easy to read and very interesting. Here is a quick synopsis:

Three teen girls on three different continents are linked by a rare mineral called Colton. It is known as blue gold because it is so valuable and used in manufacturing technology for phones and computers, but has caused conflict in the Congo where rogue militia gangs are in the conflict for control of Colton.

Sylvie's family had to flee after her father was killed and now lives in a deplorable refugee camp.

Laiping labors in a Chinese factory, soldering components for cell phones. Factory conditions are crushing, with very long hours, but she sees what happens to those who dare question the electronics company's policies and very strict rules.

Fiona is a North American girl who, in one thoughtless moment, takes a picture on her cell phone she comes to regret.

And all three teens are unexpectedly linked by these events and one thing - cell phones.

Also something new! A free UMW online course available to use as you read *So You Want to Talk about Race* by Ijeoma Oluo, a 2020 Reading Program "Bonus Book." 
