*A thoroughfare for freedom:* Does everyone in this beautiful country enjoy the freedoms that you do? What can we do to ensure that they do?

*God mend thine every flaw:* Recognizing that we have not fully achieved every ideal is not something to feel guilty about, but an opportunity to do better, with God’s help. What can we do better?

*Confirm thy soul in self-control, thy liberty in law:* How does the message of the Gospel help us to discipline our life so that liberty is extended more fully? (“discipline” = “disciple”)

*Alabaster cities, undimmed by human tears:* How can we as Catholics help to wipe away the tears of those among us who suffer in poverty, illness, hunger, injustice?

*For heroes proved in liberating strife:* Our faith is built on the foundation that the martyrs laid down along with their lives. Our nation’s privileges have a similar foundation. What does our faith say to us about this?

*Who more than self their country loved, and mercy more than life:* Mercy is the hallmark of Jesus. How can we help our nation to show mercy as a sign of true strength?

*May God thy gold refine:* Wealth and power bring responsibility. What is our role in God’s work of refining our power so that justice, love, and mercy are its goals?

*Til all success be nobleness and every gain divine:* Jesus shows what true success looks like. It looks like surrender to the will of God and sacrifice for the good of others, and it leads to the glory of eternal life. How shall we join ourselves with Him in this pursuit of true happiness?
