

Missed Opportunity?

In fact, the closest I ever got was in my last race, but I was still 2 seconds off.

In my experience, lines in the sand often trip us up in ministry. I've seen my fair share of churches express the desire to plant a church, but they never feel like they have enough people or enough money. Despite the immense amount of wealth that the Western Church has it is pretty easy to live with a scarcity mindset and call it stewardship. I don't say this out of naivety or a prosperity mindset. What I do want to convey is that there may be more resources available than we realize especially when we start taking calculated risks in kingdom investments.

What I lacked in high school was the ability to lift my head up and look around at all of the potential resources instead of just the ones in front of me. Perhaps nutrition, cross training, better sleep and so forth would have been the missing pieces to achieving my goal. In a similar way, the scarcity mentality facing many churches is that we only see what we have. We miss that the Lord has resources that we don't know about. Perhaps what is missing for us as leaders is to lift our eyes to the Lord and ask Him to provide what it would take to plant a church instead of convincing ourselves we simply don't have enough.

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
