The year was 1912. In Dallas, the beautiful new Adolphus Hotel opens, and the Houston Street viaduct is built across the Trinity River and acclaimed as the longest concrete bridge in the World. New Mexico and Arizona become the 47th and 48th states to join the Union. White Star Shipping Company's Titanic sinks in the North Atlantic leaving 1517 passengers to die in the freezing water. Jim Thorp is hailed as the "World's Greatest Athlete" at the Stockholm Olympics after triumphs in the pentathlon, decathlon, 200 meter dash, and the 1500 meter run. The U.S. Marines have a busy year landing in Honduras, Cuba, Nicaragua, and Santo Domingo to protect American interests. Lieutenant Albert Berry becomes the first person to parachute from an airplane. Arizona and Kansas become the 8th and 9th states to give women voting rights. Teddy Roosevelt states "it takes more than that to kill a Bull Moose" as he finishes an 80 minute political speech after being shot in the chest. Hunter and fisherman Leon Leonwood Bean starts a mail order business selling his rubber bottom-leather top boots. Ohio dentist Zane Grey puts away his dentist drill after he is hailed as a two-fisted storyteller with his novel *Riders of the Purple Sage*. More next week...
