

CHAIR'S NOTE



Hello OLLI friends,

I recently ran across an article that speaks to a common belief among older adults about “kids today”. We know that kids today can instantly look up information on the web. They can instantly talk to and text their friends. They get instant gratification from video games, and on and on. Because of the state of the modern world, lots of us assume that kids today want instant gratification, that they have trouble waiting for rewards. Well a recent psychology study indicates that we'd better be cautious about making a comment like that.

The article describes how a group of researchers examined data from a series of “Marshmallow Test” studies. This test famously offers children 1 marshmallow now or 2 if they wait a while. It turns out that children in 2000 waited 2 minutes longer than those in the 1960's and 1 minute longer than those in the 1980's. Why would children now be able to delay gratification longer than children of the 1960s? The researchers speculate “that increases in symbolic thought, technology, preschool education, and public attention to executive function skills have contributed to this finding”. I find it very uplifting to think about children's fundamental thinking and behavior being so improved through explicitly applied effort.

OLLI recently took a trip of 26 travelers down to Nashville, Memphis, Natchez, and New Orleans for a 10 day adventure! The group had fun taking in all the music along Broadway, Beale, and Bourbon Streets as well as their evening at the *Grand Ole Opry*.



Members also got a chance to visit several antebellum mansions, such as Stanton Hall in Natchez and Oak Alley in Louisiana,

and get a look at what the South once was. One dinner was even accompanied by a piano recital and wine tasting beforehand.

New Orleans also allowed the opportunity for dining at the famous Arnaud's and Galatoires as well as enjoying the French Quarter Festival of free music. Members learned about how Hurricane Katrina changed the city and how it was rebuilt.

Several group members also took a look at the unique Louisiana bayou with an air boat tour. Many gators floated by and fun was had by all!



CROATIA

In March twenty-nine SVSU-OLLI members traveled on a 15-day small ship adventure on the Adriatic Sea, to the Dalmatian Coast. They visited Croatia, Montenegro, Bosnia & Herzegovina. They experienced the unique culture and traditional cuisine of this region that included much grappa and brandy. One of the trip highlights was the opportunity to experience a home hosted meal with a family in a nearby village of Dubrovnik. The family that Shelley's group visited had lived in their home for over 500 years, and shared what traditions were maintained and those that had changed over time.

Members visited Krka National Park, a magical place of waterfalls and gorges, near Sibenik in the Croatia interior. They also had the opportunity to visit Hvar, Split, and the walled city of Dubrovnik. These cities along the coast included markets, fishing villages and cultural centers that members explored.

OLLI members learned about the language, architecture and the economy along with some insight into the conflict that was experienced in this region in the 90's. They heard firsthand from individuals who had their homes bombed, and they shared how this impacted their lives. This was an amazing trip! The group experienced new cultures, cuisine, music, language and dance; and we made new friends overseas!


MEMBER SPOTLIGHT

Patricia Grimley

I have been an active member of OLLI for over ten years! I retired from the St. Charles School District over 14 years ago, where I taught middle school English and social studies. The last years of my teaching career I was involved with Service Learning.

I wrote *Rainbow Hair* for my sister-in-law' Beth's grandchildren. Beth had ovarian cancer and was undergoing chemotherapy. At the time I thought that it must have been difficult for Beth's grandchildren to see Beth's baldness and to understand other effects of chemotherapy. *Rainbow Hair* approaches a difficult subject in a nonthreatening and lighthearted way. Beth lost her battle with cancer. She fought valiantly and was one of the strongest women I've known.

It's ironic that I underwent chemotherapy for breast cancer five years ago. It was my grandchildren's turn to see their grandma lose her hair and the energy to play with them for a time. I shared *Rainbow Hair* with them too. It is my hope that the book can help other children.
