### **Transfiguration Sunday**

#### **Ancient Reading ~ Luke 9:28-36**

Now about eight days after these sayings, Jesus climbed the mountain to pray, taking Peter, John, and James along. While Jesus was praying, the appearance of his face became different, and the clothes he wore became dazzlingly white (flashing with the brilliance of lightning). Suddenly two people were there talking with Jesus-- Moses and Elijah. They appeared in glory and spoke of his exodus, the one Jesus was about to complete in Jerusalem. Peter and the others had already fallen into a deep sleep, but awakening, they saw Jesus' glory—and the two people who were standing next to him. When the two were leaving, Peter said to Jesus, "Rabbi, how good it is for us to be here! Let's set up three shelters (booths, huts, dwellings), one for you, one for Moses, and one for Elijah!" Peter didn't really know what he was saying.

While Peter was speaking, a cloud came and enveloped them. As they found themselves buried in it, they became deeply aware of God. Then from the cloud came a voice that said, "This is my own, my Beloved. Listen to him!" When the sound of the voice faded away, they saw no one but Jesus standing there. They kept still, quiet, they were speechless, and they continued so, telling not one thing to anyone during those days of what they had seen.

For Christians, the abandonment of modernism's certainty is going to be a journey deeper into both biblical religion and the "tremendous mystery" of Jesus. When all can happily coexist within us, one might say... we are "saved."
