Stanley D. Moore is senior advisor for partnership development for the U.S. Census Bureau. Advising the director, deputy director and associate director for communications, Moore's work is vital to the development, outreach and implementation of an effective, successful 2020 Partnership Plan.

Formerly director for the Chicago region, Moore's previous positions include: systems analyst, district office manager, special assistant to the chief, assistant regional director, and associate director for field operations.

Moore was instrumental in developing the Topologically Integrated Geographic Encoding and Referencing system (TIGER) a technologically advanced database system that is used nationwide for mapping geographic data. TIGER has become an essential component in the compilation and tabulation of census data. He is also credited with designing a 10-stage operational and outreach program, Reaching Every Single Person On the Nation's Decennial (Operation RESPOND) that continues to be effective in educating the general public on the importance of census participation and for strengthen government and community relations.

Moore represented the United States, on behalf of the U.S. Census Bureau, at the 9th International Population Conference in Tokyo, Japan. He has received numerous prestigious service awards from the U.S. Department of Commerce including the Bronze Medal for Superior Service, the Silver Medal Award for Meritorious Service, and the Gold Medal Award for Exceptional Service. He is also a recipient of the prestigious Hammer Award for National Partnership for Reinventing Government.

Moore is a graduate of the Federal Executive Institute and has been a member of the Chicago Federal Executive Board since 1973. He holds a master's degree from Northeastern University where he received a Distinguished Alumni award. Moore's census work has been featured in several Chicago publications including Positive Note and N-DIGO. He was selected by the Leadership Council for Metropolitan Open Communities as "Most Valuable Player," and the city of Chicago named a street, "Stanley D. Moore Way" in honor of Moore's outstanding civic contributions.
