On the south edge of Bixby, veer left to stay on US 64 East when the road splits in a Y just past Bixby. Several miles past Bixby, you will cross the Snake Creek bridge. A quarter mile past the bridge, go right on 171st Street (it is a strange small turn off and not well marked). Go 1/3 mile east on 171st Street to the Euchee Butterfly Farm, located on the south/right hand side on 171st Street.

The farm has a white wooden fence and a gray metal building by the gate with two large greenhouses behind it. We will meet at the last of the three gray barns at the far end of the driveway.
