Licensed safe standing areas at football grounds

Background

- All-seater policy been in place since 1990s
- Affects grounds who are in the Premier League or Championship, or have been for three or more seasons since 1994/95, along with Wembley and the Principality Stadium
- Fan led safe standing campaigns
- New engineering solutions available to allow for standing in seated areas
- SGSA research findings

Early adopters

- 2019 Government manifesto commitment.
- Early adopters - 16 criteria and receive Ministerial approval to have licensed standing areas.
 - Necessary infrastructure – such as seats with barriers/independent barriers – in both home and away ends
 - Fans must be able to sit or stand in the licensed areas – the seats cannot be locked 'up' or 'down' position.
 - There must also be one seat/space per person.
 - Areas must not impact the viewing standards or other fans, particularly disabled fans.
 - There must be a Code of Conduct in place for fans in the licensed standing area.
 - The ground must consult with its Safety Advisory Group about plans for the licensed standing areas.
- Only areas in ground with infrastructure will be licensed standing – other areas remain seated

SG01: Safe Standing in Seated Areas

- Builds on content of Chapter 12 of the Green Guide (sixth edition)
- Provides main design and safety management issues associated with seats incorporating barriers
- Includes P & S Factor indicative questions for seated areas for safe standing

Application and approval process

- Applications closed 6 October. Six applications received.
- SGSA reviewed and submitted advice and recommendations to DCMS and Minister
- Ministerial announcement – 8 November
- New SGSA licence issued to early adopters in December
- Licensed standing areas take effect from 1 January 2022



Background

- Replaces Safety Management (Pink Guide)
- Builds on sixth edition of Guide to Safety at Sports Grounds (Green Guide), published in 2018
- Applicable to venue management and event organisers – not sport specific

SG03: Event Safety Management

Underlying principle:


“for all individuals involved in the management, organisation or hosting of an event, whatever their role, whatever the nature of the event, wherever the event is staged, the safety of all people present at that event must take precedence over every other concern”.

Event safety management planning cycle

- Planning is a dynamic process
- Planning cycle used to identify key safety considerations pre- and post-event
- Time taken by each stage may vary considerably
