The provost announced last week that there will be no face-to-face instruction during the summer term, and that the start of the term will be delayed by one week, beginning on May 13 and ending on July 31.

You can satisfy GE requirements, take electives, and in many cases make progress toward a major, minor or certificate — often at a significant discount compared to autumn and spring semesters.

With very few exceptions, the courses that were scheduled to be offered in person are now being converted to virtual instruction.

- If a course in which you were enrolled *can* be offered remotely, there is nothing you need to do; you will be automatically included in the new version of the course.
- If a course in which you were enrolled *cannot* be offered remotely, you should already have received notice of its cancellation.

We also realize that many of you have had interruptions to your summer plans. We have added some of our most popular courses to our summer offerings and added additional seats to several existing courses as a result.
