Dear Friends,

The arrival of a new year usually means the beginning of a new calendar or diary. However you keep track of the days, weeks, and months in a year, we are, right now, in a 'calendaring' time. But not all calendars run from January to December. Fiscal or academic calendars are ones with which we are familiar. So, too, is the liturgical calendar that the Church uses, marked by seasons and special days, not weeks or months.

In a short period of time, we have gone from the end of the (non-)season of Ordinary Time, the (seemingly) endless Sundays after Pentecost that fill up the summer and fall, into the Advent season, defined by the four Sundays before Christmas, and now find ourselves in the twelve days of Christmas that will conclude January 6 on the Feast of the Epiphany. Then it will be back to Ordinary Time, which will run us up to Lent, which is followed by Easter, and the 'annual' cycle will have gone around once more.

One of the ways the Church marks the passage of the seasons is the use of color—in vestments, hangings, and even candles. To the question 'is it green, or purple (or blue), or white, or red', the answer is yes. The truth is that there is no 'right' or 'wrong' in terms of ecclesiastical color. Using color to designate seasons or special days is simply a matter of tradition, certainly not of doctrine (please don't tell the Altar Guild)! But traditions are important, and perhaps a simple key to the use of colors in the Church might be helpful.

White (or gold) is used for feast days that commemorate events in the life of Jesus—Christmas, Epiphany, Easter, the Annunciation, and the Transfiguration, and for events which celebrate our incorporation into his life, death, and resurrection, like baptisms, funerals, and All Saints'. Red reminds us of the fiery power of the Holy Spirit, and is used on Pentecost, and at ordinations, and the consecration of a new church. Since red is also the color of blood, it is used to commemorate the saints, many of whom were martyrs. Purple is used in Lent because it is a royal color, and a somber one, too. It is suitable for the tone of Lent, and for our King, crowned with thorns, wrapped in a purple cloak and mocked by the soldiers who beat him. We sometimes use blue in Advent because it is a color long associated with the Virgin Mary, although having blue and purple vestments and hangings was and is, for many, a bit extravagant for relatively brief seasons.

And, finally, there is green, Kermit the Frog's favorite color. Green is used in Ordinary Time, between Epiphany and Lent, and in the long summer and fall months. Among other things, green is the color of creation, of the grass, and the trees; it is the color of the kingdom of God—the vineyard in which we are called to work. There are other colors used occasionally like pink or rose on the third Sunday of Advent, burgundy in Holy Week, and even black, for veiling crosses on Good Friday.

In many parts of the world, a church may have only one set of hangings, and use it 52 weeks a year. Some Christian traditions make no use of color at all. Whatever your background of tradition or location, what is important is what and who it is to which the colors point us—the saving work of God in Jesus Christ, and God’s unmerited love for us. That is not tradition, that is the true good news to which we bear witness in all seasons.

As a new year rolls over on your calendar, may 2019 will be filled with the colorful brightness of God.

From the Prayer Ministry

Let Hope Light Your Way

A timeless New Year's Message from 1987 by Dr. Norman Vincent Peale,
Cofounder, Guideposts

Do you remember that marvelous night last summer when floodlights blazed in New York Bay and the Statue of Liberty emerged from the darkness, lovingly restored, golden torch held high, fireworks sparkling around her? I heard of one little boy watching on TV, who said, "She's trying to say something."

Perhaps she was. If the Lady with the Lamp could speak a single word, I think I know what that word would be: HOPE. Hope is what she offered to millions of immigrants who came to these shores yearning for a better life. And hope is what she still symbolizes today.

Hope. As a new year comes to all of us, what better companion could we have? Hope is a dynamic force, a concept full of power. It can bring the weak back to strength. It can bring the sick back to health. It can even turn failure into success. No wonder Saint Paul included it as one of three great principles of Christianity: faith, hope, and love.

What's the condition of hope in your life at this very moment? Does it get up with you every morning? Does it carry you confidently through the day? Is it still there, soothing and sustaining you, as you fall asleep? That's what God intended when he created this shining quality and poured it into us at birth. If cares and worries and fears and discouragement have gained ascendancy in your mind, then you need to open the windows of your soul and let a strong, fresh current of hope come surging through.

Ah, you may say, it's all very well to talk like that, but I have very real health problems and money problems and problems with my children or my marriage. Just wishing won't make them go away, will it?

I'm not talking about wishing. Wishing is weak. It's even faintly negative, because when you say "I wish", it usually means you don't believe the wish will come true. But when you hope—really hope—then a magic ingredient comes into play. That ingredient is expectancy. Expectancy says, "This desired outcome can happen. I think it's going to happen. Right now it may be just a dream, but it's a realizable dream." When you start hoping instead of just wishing, then expectation is stirring in you.

We've all heard of people who have suffered near fatal accidents whose will to live, whose hope of recovery was so strong that they did, in fact, recover. Any doctor will tell you that a seriously ill patient who hopes strongly for recovery has a far better chance of survival than one who waits passively or simply gives up. The records of prisoners of war, even those in concentration camps, clearly show that the captives who survive best are the ones who never give up. They never stop hoping, and the power of hope brings them through.

Saint Paul sums it up in just six words: "For we are saved by hope...." (Romans 8:24) If you can reach the point—and you CAN reach It—where hope and expectation blend into faith and conviction, nothing can defeat you.

I have lived a long time now, and have known and observed many people through the years. And I maintain that the nearer a person comes to the Savior, the more hope he or she has. You just cannot live with Jesus Christ and be defeated. You cannot live with Him and say, "Tomorrow is not going to be any good." Because He is the Lord of tomorrows.

So, as you move into the New Year, HOPE that difficulties will pass. HOPE that storms will cease. HOPE that pain will end. HOPE that weakness will be overcome.

Remember, you do not go into the New Year on your own, but with the loving God who has walked with you ever since you were a young child. Light the flame of hope and watch the shadows vanish.



ADELAIDE LEITZEL


