Dear Friends.

As we prepare to usher in the New Year, 5786, I extend to each of you my heartfelt blessings for a year of health, peace, and renewal. This season of reflection and return offers us the chance to draw near to our deepest values, to one another, and to God.

But this year, we enter the High Holidays carrying a heavier burden.

We are still grieving, still anxious, still wrestling with deep pain and fear. **The war in Israel continues**, casting its long shadow across the Jewish world. Each day brings new reports of heartbreak and heroism, of sorrow and resilience. We watch with anguish as the innocent suffer, soldiers risk their lives, the hostages and their families endure the unimaginable, and all the while we pray for true peace to come. And we feel, too, the tremors of rising **antisemitism here in America** — in our cities, our campuses, and even our neighborhoods — challenging our sense of safety and belonging.

In such a time, it would be easy to let fear replace faith. It would be understandable to retreat into despair. But Judaism calls on us to respond differently. As the prophet Isaiah once cried out:

ַלְמַעַן צִיוֹן לֹא אָחֲשֶׂה וּלְמַעַן יְרוּשָׁלָ ם לֹא אֶשׁקוֹט עַד־יֵצֵא כַנֹגַה צִּדְקֹה וִישׁוּעַחָה כָּלַפֵּיד יִבעַר:

"For the sake of Zion I will not be silent, for the sake of Jerusalem I will not be still, till her victory emerge resplendent and her triumph like a flaming torch." (Isaiah 62:1)

Even in the darkness, there is light that comes from beyond ourselves—a divine light that does not go out. So, I offer you this refrain for the season ahead, drawn from the Torah and echoed throughout our tradition:

Hazak ve'ematz — אַמֶּץ חַוַק "Be strong and courageous." (Deuteronomy 31:7)

Let this be our call to one another:

Hazak ve'ematz — when we teach our children to be proud Jews in a complicated world.

Hazak ve'ematz — when we light Shabbat candles, sing songs of peace, and gather in prayer.

Hazak ve'ematz — when we refuse to let hatred define us or division break us.

Hazak ve'ematz — when we affirm life, love, and hope, even if the world seems to deny them.

This is the Jewish way. We are not strangers to adversity. But neither are we strangers to resilience, compassion, or joy. Throughout the centuries, we have held fast to Torah, to each other, and to the dream of a world redeemed.

As we approach **Rosh Hashanah and Yom Kippur**, may the blasts of the shofar awaken in us courage and clarity. May our prayers be a source of strength. May we merit a year in which we see more healing than hatred, more unity than division, and more peace than pain.

Shanah Tovah uMetukah — a sweet, strong, and meaningful New Year - and always: Hazak ve'ematz!

HIGH HOLY DAY TICKETS- MEMBERS

Tickets for member families are included in the general dues structure and such tickets are valid for the adult members of the family and their children, **26** and under.

High Holiday tickets will be mailed on August 27, 2025 to members in good standing. A member is considered to be in good standing if:

- · Membership dues are paid in full
- All past and current balances which include Religious School tuition are paid in full
- All Bar/Bat Mitzvah fees and assessments are paid in full

If your account is brought up to date after tickets are mailed, tickets will be available for pick up in the main office or they will be held for you at the "Will Call" table at the Synagogue.

Tickets are not transferable and are only valid for the individual they are issued to. Please be prepared to show photo identification.

For safety and security, tickets will need to be shown each time you arrive at all NSJC services.

Tickets for those families whose accounts are not current will be held by the Executive Director who will be available in the synagogue's main office for brief conferences with congregants on the following day:

Wednesday, September 17, 2025 from 7:00pm to 8:00pm

Last day for ticket pickup is Thursday, September 18, 2025 at 3:00pm

HIGH HOLIDAY TICKETS-GUESTS/RECIPROCAL SEATING

OUT OF AREA GUESTS

Guest tickets are available for purchase for out of area guests. Guest tickets may not be purchased for friends or family living within a 15-mile radius of NSJC (we encourage those within this radius to contact us directly). Guest tickets are required for anyone 13 years or older. A full set of services ticket is available for \$125.

Guest ticket orders must be received with payment at the Synagogue office by August 29, 2025. We appreciate your submission of these forms in a timely manner.

RECIPROCAL TICKETS

Members in good standing at another conservative synagogue who would like to spend the holidays at NSJC should fill out the Reciprocal Seating Form. This form must be received by the synagogue office no later than August 29, 2025. Once received, reciprocal tickets will be issued.

If you have any questions or requests regarding your tickets, please contact the office at 631-928-3737 and a staff member will assist you.

SECURITY PROCEDURES

For the safety of everyone, please cooperate with the Suffolk police and our private security officers who will be monitoring all services. In addition, please adhere to the following:

- The Synagogue driveway must remain clear at all times
- You may drop off passengers in the front of the main doors/handicapped ramp, but please do not park or leave a car standing in the driveway for any reason
 - Please do not park in or obstruct the road of our lot
- Please do not bring backpacks, briefcases, suitcases and/or large bags- you will not be allowed to bring them into the building.
- All handbags and personal items brought into the building are subject to search. If an
 item is deemed inappropriate, you will be asked to leave it in your car.
