

Ireland Tour - June 23 - July 1, 2017

For the second time in ten years, the FCCC Chamber Singers visited Ireland on our annual summer tour! We performed five concerts and two Masses over nine days, in addition to numerous impromptu events. We departed Fairfield Woods Middle School on Friday, June 23 at 1:30 PM, arriving in Ireland at 6:00 AM (1:00 AM Eastern US time) on Saturday. At 1:00 PM we performed our first concert in Limerick at St. Augustine's Church as part of the Limerick Sings International Choral Festival, even though some choristers had fallen asleep (due to jet lag) while listening to some of the other choirs. We then toured St. John's Castle, built between 1200 and 1210, and attended a festival concert in the evening.

On Sunday we traveled to Adare for another well-received concert at the Holy Trinity Church. Later that evening we enjoyed a singing dinner with another of the Limerick Festival choirs. On Monday we traveled to the Boyne Valley for an early rehearsal with the prominent Irish harpist Anne-Marie O'Farrell, followed by two concerts for the An Chúirt Chruitireachta International Harp Festival (A Court of Harping) in Drogheda and Termonfeckin. We experienced a case of true serendipity upon our arrival in Drogheda. We had prepared four of Anne-Marie's arrangements, including *The Salley Gardens*, set to a text by William Butler Yeats, one of Ireland's greatest poets. One of the harpists at the festival was assigned to guide our group from the rehearsal to the first performance. In an unassuming manner, she introduced herself as Caitríona Yeats, the granddaughter of the poet, who has been a member of the Boston Symphony Orchestra and the Cincinnati Orchestra, among others!

Tuesday was scheduled to be a day off from performing as we toured the capital city of Dublin. The highlights included a visit to Trinity College Dublin and the Old Library (right out of Harry Potter!) and a visit to the downtown shopping district. The evening plan was dinner and a show at the Abbey Tavern in Howth. However, when the performers found out they had a choir in the audience, we ended up singing five or six songs with and for them.

Wednesday took us to Belfast, Northern Ireland, where we began with a tour of the city, including the Falls Roads area where murals tell the story of its violent past and its belief in the future. The gable ends of houses were painted with vivid murals to proclaim a neighborhood's political affiliations, and remain a much-photographed part of Belfast's past. A major highlight of the tour was our visit to the Titanic Museum, located in the heart of Belfast, right beside the historic site of this world-famous ship's construction and launch. Another highlight was our performance at a Mass followed by a concert at the historic Clonard Monastery which has the most incredible acoustics. Our host, Cathal Murphy (cousin of chorister Maddie McDermott!), informed our boys that the room in which they were changing was the very room in which the Good Friday peace accords were drafted in April 1998 by the opposing parties. Interestingly, one of the famous peace walls stands just behind the church, separating Protestant and Catholic neighborhoods.

On Thursday we traveled westwards to County Mayo to visit Knock Shrine, a major international Catholic pilgrimage and prayer site, where we performed for a Mass of the Sick. We then continued on to our final hotel in Galway. Friday was the major touring day of the entire trip. We drove through the Burren to the absolutely incredible Cliffs of Moher, Ireland's most visited natural attraction with a magical vista that captures the hearts of up to 1 million visitors each year. The Cliffs rise up to 700 feet at the highest point and range for 5 miles over the Atlantic Ocean on the western seaboard of County Clare. Later on Friday we returned to Galway for a tour, passing the Salt Proms and having a great time in the Latin Quarter, full of shops and street musicians. On Saturday we took a flight from Shannon to New York, finally arriving at FWMS at about 6:00 PM with memories that will last a lifetime!

One final memory sticks with me as I reflect on the trip. Our last night in Galway, the kid's very proud bus driver, Colin, asked them to perform for the hotel staff and guests. As the children launched into their favorite Gaelic tune I watched their faces. The smiles, the laughs, the tears, the pride. It was at that final moment they realized how GOOD they were! How special that moment was. How special this week was. It was a moment frozen in time. It was a moment that you created for us all through your tireless dedication to this choir. It was a moment that we will never ever forget.
