Fast Facts About Breast Cancer

Each year in the United States, more than 250,000 women get breast cancer and 42,000 women die from the disease.

Men also get breast cancer, but it is not very common. About 1 out of every 100 breast cancers diagnosed in the United States is found in a man.

Most breast cancers are found in women who are 50 years old or older, but breast cancer also affects younger women.

Other than skin cancer, breast cancer is the most common cancer among American women.

Mammograms are the best way to find breast cancer early, when it is easier to treat and before it is big enough to feel or cause symptoms.

Pink Patch Project

The Omaha Police Department is excited to participate in the "**Pink Patch Project**". This will be the agencies' 4th year participating in the nationwide initiative. Each agency chooses a charity to donate the proceeds from merchandise sales and donations. This year's merchandise will include shirts, patches, and masks.

Proceeds from the Omaha Police Department's **Pink Patch Project** benefit the Hereditary Cancer Foundation, a charity founded in memory of Omaha Police Officer Kamie Preston, who was diagnosed with breast cancer at the age of 35 and passed away at the age of 40 from the disease. The organization pays for hereditary cancer testing for mutations like BRCA and Lynch Syndrome that dramatically increase a person's risk of developing cancer. 10-15% of all cancers are caused by inherited gene mutations. This knowledge can offer options for prevention; surgery, screening and medication or can help guide a cancer patient's treatment by providing insight to more appropriate, targeted therapies.

Robbery Series Arrest:

Officers got information that the suspects were in a white Buick. Officers spotted the vehicle and were able to arrest two suspects involved after a 2 minute pursuit.
