Subject: Suspicious Activity Reporting (SAR) Training

All:

We wanted to send along another correspondence regarding Suspicious Activity Reporting (SAR) training and resources to our private sector partners in advance of the Chicago Marathon.

As you know, the OEMC has partnered with the U.S. Department of Homeland Security (DHS) and the Chicago Police Department's Crime Prevention and Information Center (CPIC) to establish and conduct in-person Suspicious Activity Reporting (SAR) training over the last several years. This training focuses on how to identify suspicious activity which could be an indicator of a terrorist attack or other criminal activity and share that information with law enforcement. Since 2017, the OEMC in partnership with DHS and CPIC has trained more than 5,000 individuals from city departments and the private sector. We have focused our training thus far on security personnel, field personnel, and the hotel and hospitality sector.

Additionally, DHS has developed training videos and suspicious activity indicators to assist with recognizing the kinds of suspicious behaviors that may be related to terrorism activities; understanding how and where to report this information; and protecting privacy, civil rights, and civil liberties when reporting information.
