Public Servant of the Year: Eric Burich

Eric Burich has been a Brillion firefighter since February 2000. That might be the definition of public servant.

"It flies by," Burich said.

In those two decades, Burich went from a young firefighter to lieutenant to now a deputy chief.

"Taking on a leadership role in the last two decades has probably been my biggest change in operation there," Burich said.

Burich is from Brillion and knew he wanted to become involved following his graduation from Brillion

High School in 1999.

"It was something to do after high school. I knew I was going to stick around Brillion and I wanted something to give back to the community, but at the same time, it really intrigued me the idea of being a firefighter and volunteering in that kind of a facet," Burich said.

When he was notified of the award, it hit Burich deeply.

"I'm incredibly humbled. I would have never expected. I'm not a big public speaker, really," Burich said. "Just knowing that there's a lot of really good leadership on the fire department and we're surrounded by great people, not only in the community, but all around."

Business of the Year: Carstens Mill

Beth Wenzel had a vision for the Carstens Mill building. It has now been nearly five years that she has held events ranging from weddings, live entertainment and charitable events.

"It's just really cool that people notice that you're working so hard to do something that makes other people so happy," Wenzel said. "That's what's really cool is that people recognize that."

With the exception of when he earned a college degree from the University of Wisconsin-Stout and when he served in the Army for 20 years, both active and reserve, Zane Zander has been a resident of Brillion his entire life.

ing the community. Zander has been a member of the Brillion Plan Commission for more than 45 years, a member of American Legion, a member of the Brillion Chamber of Commerce and a founding member of the Brillion Optimist Club. He is currently the last living founding member of the Optimists.

"If you're going to start a business, you either have to do something that's really going to attract the locals or it's going to attract a certain percentage of those people within that acceptable distance," Wenzel said.

As co-owner of Zander Press, Wenzel says she envisioned herself as the owner of a second business.

"I guess I'm not surprised that it leads towards weddings because prior to coming [to Zander] I was doing a lot of bridal sewing, so I guess I would have thought it would have been more related to that like a dress shop, but it turns out to still be wedding related," Wenzel said.

Brillion Area Family of Funds Volunteer of the Year: Tammy Koehler

Longtime member of the Optimist Club and all-around city volunteer, Tammy Koehler is being rec-
