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A MESSAGE FROM PASTOR KESSINGER

MAY OF 2024 POISED FOR GROWTH

Have you noticed? As I drive in and around downtown McLean and the Tysons area, I am amazed at how many apartment complexes and condominiums are being built. If all of these new housing developments fill up with people (as expected), then I believe Redeemer would be wise to position itself for growth. People need a place to worship. We need to let people know that Redeemer has much to offer in worship and in service to our community.

WHERE DO WE START?

Over the years, I have been involved in conversations about church growth. All of them start by asking church leaders to explore the reasons they want to grow. Without fail, many will share that they want their church to grow in order to increase membership and/or their worship attendance which might then lead to an increase in financial giving. Those leading the seminars are quick to say that such a mindset will not bring in more people. It is too focused on the self and not on the other.

Churches that grow invite people to come because they have something to offer. The most important thing any church has to offer is the gospel message. How is it proclaimed? Is the message relevant to peoples' lives? Does the gospel that is preached match what people experience when they walk into the church? What I share in the rest of this article is some of the insights gained over the years from those who serve growing congregations and what it might mean for us.

GROWING CHURCHES HAVE A CLEAR MISSION STATEMENT

A mission statement directs everything that we do as a congregation. It means that every action we take at Redeemer should be placed alongside our mission statement which is "to share Christ's love with the greatest number of people." It is a good statement in that it is concise and conveys an openness to reach beyond our church walls out into the community. It is centered on our understanding that everything we do is out of thanksgiving for what God has done for us through his Son, Jesus Christ.

Do all of our activities align with our mission?

GROWING CHURCHES ENGAGE THE YOUTH EFFECTIVELY

One of the first questions that families will ask when visiting our church is what we have to offer their children. And then a series of questions follow. Do we have a Sunday School program? How old do our children have to be in order to start? Do we have an active youth group? Does our youth group include younger children? What do you offer for teenagers?

I am not a big fan of the statement that the youth is the future of the church. It is a true statement but I believe that we encourage youth participation for other reasons:

to help them understand they are an important part of our faith community <u>already</u>.

to nurture their faith so that they, too, can carry the gospel message out into the world.

to give them the spiritual tools they need to live in a complicated culture.

to live out their love for God and neighbor.

Do our youth feel like they are part of Redeemer?

GROWING CHURCHES SEEK VOLUNTEERS

The work of the church is the work of the people. If the onus of responsibility rests only on the shoulders of the pastor and ministry staff then it will most certainly stumble along. When people volunteer in the church, it allows for a variety of gifts to be used for the good of all. The more that people get engaged in the overall ministry of the church, the more they understand what is needed for a church to function at its best. At the same time, the leadership needs to support and encourage volunteers. Volunteers need to find joy in what they are doing to fulfill the mission of the church.

Do our volunteers feel valued?

GROWING CHURCHES MAKE CONNECTIONS

Connections start the minute that people walk through our doors and are greeted by those who open the doors for them. We do well with those who come to us but it is equally important to go out to meet others. Service projects keep us connected with the community. Collaborating with our ecumenical partners is a strong witness. Simply being visible in the community and sharing with others our excitement about being part of Redeemer is a wonderful guide.

How well do we connect with our community?

GROWING CHURCHES MAKE THEMSELVES KNOWN

We have a website and we are on Facebook. We use many of the means of communication available to us. We just adopted a new Welcome Statement. We want to be able to get the word out that we are an open and inclusive church to those who are not sure they will be safe once inside. We have to be ready and prepared to receive them with open arms.

How do we make ourselves known in the community?

SO WHERE DO WE START?

We are preparing our church building for growth with the outdoor playground area, the refurbishing of the classrooms and offices, and the addition of a columbarium. It will be a visible sign to the community that something is happening here at Redeemer. We can use this time to think about how we can match our efforts to prepare our ministry for growth. These five statements and their corresponding questions will give us much

to consider. I am excited about what lies ahead for our community and Redeemer. I confess that we have work to do. We pray for God to guide and direct us in our efforts as we keep the gospel message front and center.

From one of my favorite Bible passages found in Romans 10:

For how are they to call on One in whom they have not believed?

And how are they to believe in One of whom they have never heard?

And how are they to hear without someone to proclaim Him?

And how are they to proclaim Him unless they are sent?

As it is written: How beautiful are the feet of those who bring good news!

Minutes of Meeting of Redeemer Congregation Council In Person and via Zoom April 8, 2024

Call to Order:

President Kennedy called the meeting to order at 7:34 PM.

Devotions:

Council members read aloud letters that Redeemer's confirmands wrote and addressed to the Council as part of their lesson on Paul's Letter to the Romans.

Adoption of Agenda:

Without objection, the agenda was adopted as sent in advance of the meeting.

Pastor Kessinger's Report:

Pastor Kessinger submitted her report via email in advance of the meeting. Some of the items she highlighted in her report included:

- Connections through Pastoral Care. Pastor Kessinger made a significant number of home visits during
 the month of March to those who are unable to attend services. It included visits to a congregant in hospice care.
- Transfers. One family moved out of the DC area to the Midwest and joined a church there.
- Connections through Ministries of the Congregations. Lenten services were well attended and well done.
- Connections through Meetings, the Synod and the Community were ongoing and varied.
- **General Comments.** The office's two printers need updating. Quotes are being collected for replacements, and both leasing and purchasing options are under consideration. Planning for guidelines for the columbarium is underway.
- Looking Ahead. Pastor Kessinger is traveling to Pittsburgh (April 9-11) and Houston (August 15-20). New Members' Classes are planned for April 14. First Communion class is scheduled for April 21. A Worship Workshop is planned for April 28 to provide guidance for potential acolytes/crucifers and Assisting Ministers during worship.

Approval of Minutes:

Minutes from the meeting were previously approved by email.

Executive Committee Summary:

The Executive Committee met April 2, 2024, and developed the discussion items that we are covering this evening.

Treasurer's Report

Ed Regan reviewed the line items in the Balance Sheet (March 31, 2024) the Profit and Loss Report (January-March 2024), the Pre-School Profit and Loss Statement (August 2023-March 2024), and the Working Capital Informational Worksheet (March 31, 2024) to provide context and background for the monthly Financial Summary report. Points of discussion included:

- At the end of March, income exceeded expenses by \$106, 000. Pastor Kessinger noted the Congregation's generosity to Redeemer and our financial commitment to the Synod and to non-profits.
- Depreciation is currently not factored in the Balance Sheet, as Redeemer considers life cycle replacement
 of fixed assets in its overall planning.
- At the end of the year, the net income from preschool will be deducted from the Working Capital Liability line.
- The Council noted the Congregation's and Redeemer Renaissance's healthy reserve funds and substantial building and grounds assets and reiterated their commitment to maintain these assets. The Council was referred to the synod's finance training guidance webinar on auditing and internal controls.

Discussion Item: Recruitment and Engagement.

Ellen Kennedy invited council members to think of potential new members to the various ministry teams. The Council expressed interest in encouraging engagement in church activities, enlarging the pool of worship assistants, and establishing momentum for youth group activities.

Discussion Item: Staffing Changes.

In order to provide long term and sustainable support for the Senior Pastor and the ministries at Redeemer, Pastor Kessinger presented the council with potential alternatives to engaging a new Associate Pastor. The council discussed options such as a "Word and Service" position, which would provide a second person who could preach during services, or an altogether new position which could combine oversight of youth programs and communication outreach. A job description would need to be drafted for either option.

Discussion Item: Beyond Measure Update

Tyler Posey presented a summary of the March 26 meeting held by the Beyond Measure committee, chaired by Mary O'Brien. The committee will work to identify a member of each ministry team to serve as that team's point of contact with the capital campaign. The committee also completed and filed an application for a \$25,000 matching grant.

Discussion Item: Prep: Special Congregation Meeting 4/28/24

Pastor Kessinger and Ellen Kennedy confirmed that written ballots will be prepared in advance of each meeting to vote regarding the adoption of the Welcome Statement.

Discussion Item: Farewell Plans – Seminarian Jessica Zurcher

Jessica's last day is May 5. The council will organize refreshments to be available after each of the three services on that day.

Ministry Reports

- Tyler Posey reported on the Stewardship Ministry team meeting, which was held March 21. A member of
 the ministry team will update the volunteer booklet, and the quarterly letter to the congregation will be
 released soon. The committee continues to develop a monthly list of volunteer opportunities. The Synod
 has a worksheet of stewardship principles that the committee will review throughout the year. The Stewardship team will encourage neighborhood gatherings for congregants who live close to each other.
- Other ideas to promote engagement include a gratitude jar and hosting social activities such as line dancing and pickleball were discussed.

Nate Paukovits reported that Redeemer Renaissance is meeting April 9 to review the charter.

New Business:

None. A status report of the stove upgrade will be forthcoming.

Closing Prayer:

The meeting was closed with the Lord's Prayer.

Adjournment:

President Kennedy adjourned the meeting at 9:20 PM.

Construction Project Update for April

Many of the benefits from the renovation of the original classrooms and offices will come from the replacement of the 65-year-old boiler system. In addition to it being at the end of its expected life, the heat radiators run through the walls between the rooms and offices, allowing noise to pass between these rooms. Also, these individual rooms do not have control over their own temperature settings. Since this system only produces heat, window-mounted AC units are also required, which are very noisy and not energy efficient. The new HVAC system addresses all of these shortcomings.

The renovated Natural Play Area will have many new features which will benefit our preschool kids, after-school kids, church families and the community. These features include a covered pavilion, out-door class-room, earthen-mound slides, expanded sand play area, water channel, additional playground equipment, grass playing field, paths and walkways, educational garden beds and safety fencing. All these items can be seen in the artist's renderings displayed in Crossroads.

The detailed design work is underway for the Columbarium. Soon we will be able to show you an up-dated rendering of how it will all look. The Columbarium will be a ministry of Redeemer and will be a structure for ashes to be placed from those who have died. It provides a prayerful, respectful place for families and friends to visit and honor their loved ones. Gifts given to the capital campaign will help finance the construction. Those who purchase individual niches will also offset the upfront costs and ongoing maintenance.

Redeemer's Capital Campaign has received 54% of the pledges needed towards our goal of \$2.7M. Making a gift towards the campaign is a great opportunity to honor someone important to you and your family or to just give thanks for all the blessings in your life. The pledge process is still underway and pledge cards are available at the table in the Crossroads lobby. Of course, all financial gifts will be gladly received with or without a pledge.

Beyond Measure (Capital Campaign) Task Force Ministry Update Save the date!

May 2024 Endowment Committee Report

In the first quarter, Redeemer's Endowment Committee awarded two grants supporting children's education in our area: \$1,500 to Generation Hope for their Next Generation Academy and \$1,500 for The Fishing School for parent engagement activities to address pandemic learning loss.

The excerpts below from the organizations' websites and reports give a brief overview of their work. Their web addresses provide more detailed information. Both organizations are supported & were suggested by Redeemer members. If you would like to nominate a non-profit organization serving people locally or elsewhere for consideration of a modest one-time grant, please contact the Endowment Committee.



Founded in the District of Columbia in 2010 and expanded to New Orleans in 2023, Generation Hope supports student parents through a comprehensive, two generation approach. They know that fewer than 2% of teen mothers earn a college degree before age 30, and more than half of all parenting college students leave school without a degree.

Founded in 2010, Generation Hope works directly with young parents earning their college degrees and with their young children to prepare them for kindergarten, advocates nationally for the unique needs of student parents and their families, and partners with colleges and universities to provide technical assistance to advance student parent success in higher education.

Specifically, our \$1,500 grant supports **Generation Hope's local early childhood program, Next Generation Academy**. It provides robust literacy, academic, and social-emotional supports so that their Scholars children enter kindergarten ready to thrive. Through their two-generation model, Generation Hope provides young families with the foundation they need to create legacies of educational and economic opportunity.

For 34 years, The Fishing School (TFS) has prepared elementary and middle school students for success in high school and life by improving their academic performance and life skills, and by engaging them and their parents in intensive multi-year, research-based out-of-school time (OST) and parent engagement activities.

Their work is more important in the aftermath of the pandemic. The pressing issue is the profound learning loss experienced by children. During the peak pandemic years, EmpowerK12, an education research organization, tracked how students were falling behind – EmpowerK12's last report on academic recovery following the pandemic, produced in Spring 2022, found that "at-risk" students were 15-18 months behind, on average; EmpowerK12 also predicts that it will take up to five years to reach pre-pandemic achievement levels in DC public schools.

The Fishing School recognizes the importance of involving parents and communities in supporting children's learning and have embedded ways to engage parents in student learning. Their Parent Engagement Program follows the framework of Dr. Joyce Epstein's six identified types of parent involvement, a philosophy of interdependence that creates overlapping spheres of influence for students, combining support from families, schools, and the community.

Our \$1,500 grant is targeted to their Parent Engagement Activities. We hope to assist The Fishing School's End of Year Showcase-Parent Engagement Night in June and host a representative at Redeemer. Here is your April ham report.

On April 4, Rick Stewart delivered 13 boxes of ham weighing 455 pounds to MANNA from the Falls Church and Fairfax Honey Baked Ham Stores. On April 5, Rick Stewart delivered 3 boxes of ham weighing 105 pounds to Martha's Table from the Reston Honey Baked Ham store.
