# APRIL OF 2023 PRAYING THE PSALMS

arch was an interesting month from a pastoral perspective. With joy we received awesome new members, baptized adorable infants, and had incredible Lenten meals and worship experiences on Wednesday evenings. I attended and presided over an amazing wedding over a two-day period that combined two cultures and two different faith traditions.

We also held a Stewardship meeting and invited the Executive Committee from our council to discuss the next steps for our approved building and grounds project. Rob Wenk presented us with the overview. We then started to explore what we needed to do to set up a Capital Campaign to raise the funds necessary to complete the project. We are hopeful that the people at Redeemer will receive the invitation to pledge towards the campaign with the same generosity that everyone has shown in the past!

The joys of ministry that I just outlined help us get through the more challenging times. In March the McLean clergy group from a wide variety of faith traditions gathered at Redeemer for fellowship and discussion. We have been meeting for some time now so this conversation was more serious. We reflected on what is happening in our area and in our nation that need our collective attention. Here are some outcomes of our discussion.

- A small group of us will take the lead to find the best ways to gather the people from our different houses of worship to discuss our response to the hatred we see in this world and in our country.
- 2) A member of the McLean Police force also sits at the table with us to listen to whatever concerns we have and to see where they can be of help. It has been wonderful to have their presence and it keeps us informed of what we need to be aware of in our day-to-day activities and when we gather for worship.
- 3) In our conversation they made us aware of the effect that drugs and the isolation of the pandemic has had on the overall health of our young people. More and more of our youth are showing signs of depression. The pressures they experience in school compounds their struggles. It comes on the heels of Redeemer hosting an event that was organized by Safe Community Coalition that centered on how to reduce anxiety.

I have always said that the call to a congregation is also a call to the wider church and to the community that we serve. We seem to be at a Kairos (critical) moment to act. God is calling us to respond in faithful ways not only to the joys of ministry but to the different ways that the people

are hurting. Prayer is important and necessary. We must also act. What does that mean?

I will be honest in that I am still thinking it through. I know we will be at the table to plan for some kind of seminar that will address the violence and hatred we see every day. I write this article on the heels of another mass shooting. This time it was at a Christian school in Nashville where three children and three adults were killed. The mere fact that we can sit down and discuss this in healthy ways will be a big step forward.

As for the young people in our church and in our community, it occupies my mind day and night. Once again we see so many joys with our young people. Our Faith Formation classes (Pre-school through Grade 6) are well attended as is the Confirmation and High School classes. We have a High School Leadership team that is open to all in that age group. You have heard of our work this fall in doing environmental clean-up in the Anacostia area of the District.

And starting in April we have another project that needs the help of the entire congregation. We will be collecting specific food items that will then be packed up for elementary school children who need extra food on the weekends. Look for the details in another part of this newsletter! We will accept monetary donations and shop for any items that we are still lacking by the end of the drive.

Pastor Josh has good attendance for the Youth Group that meet every Sunday night for dinner and activities. We want to build on that to include the younger grades. We had one Parents' Night Out where we took care of the children while parents spent a couple of hours to themselves! We would love to find other ways to engage our youth. With Sunrise Senior Living opening up in the next month or two we have a wonderful opportunity to do intergenerational activities.

I am a strong believer that if we want the world to change in good and healthy ways we, as adults, need to do our part to nurture and foster the values that our children will need as they grow older. In our Lenten series we just completed the five gifts of discipleship that are said at every baptism and when we confirm our young people —

- to live among God's faithful people,
- to hear his Word and share in his Supper,
- to proclaim the good news of God in Christ through word and deed,
- to serve all people, following the example of Jesus Christ,
- and to strive for justice and peace.

It is the place to start for those who are already inside the church. Now we need to find effective ways to meet the youth who are outside our church doors. Our connections with the community are growing stronger. It is my hope and desire to network with other organizations. I have already been in touch with the Safe Community Coalition and hope to reach out to our local schools to be partners in this endeavor.

March has made me think how we can be more of a presence in our community. We are a work in progress and open to any thoughts or direction you can give us.

#### Dear Siblings in Christ,

As I look outside, it is clear that Spring is upon us. The Dogwoods, Bradford Pears, and Cherry Trees are all blooming, and we are starting to see buds of life on all sorts of other vegetation as well. As we look towards the Spring and Summer months, I am reminded of how busy our youth will be in this coming season. Which is why, in this month's article, I want to highlight all that our youth have been and will be doing in the coming months ahead.



Recently, our youth group has been hard at work working to improve the Butterfly Garden on the backside of our property. Teaming up with the Preschool/ Afterschool programs we are preparing the beds to welcome some

new friends to our grounds - the Preschool program is growing and hatching butterflies! So, in looking forward to welcoming our new guests towards the end of May, we want to make sure they have a place to call home. Our group has started by weeding and prepping the bed for new soil, and in the coming weeks will begin to plant native flowers/pollinators for the butterfly's enjoyment.

Coming up towards the end of April, PSK and I will be traveling to Camp Caroline Furnace with the Confirmation Class for our annual retreat. There we will spend the weekend focused on fellowship and team building. We will spend time hiking, canoeing, completing their confidence course, playing plenty of games, eating plenty of sugary snacks, and of course, end the day with a campfire. This time away has proven to be a great opportunity for our youth to bond and create friendships that they can rely on as they prepare for Confirmation and the high school years ahead.

Lastly, coming up in June, PSK and I will be traveling to Logan County, WV, with our youth group for the summer mission trip. Along with Lon and Denise Augustenborg, we will travel with ten youth and participate in the YouthWorks summer project there. This will be a rural assignment, and due to economic strife in that area of the country, much of our work will be focused on serving those who live in poverty. We will serve in food pantries, soup kitchens, and

clothing distribution centers. I am told there may even be an opportunity for



home improvement projects with the elderly in the community as well. No matter the project, this opportunity will allow our youth to see and serve God and God's people in new and eye-opening ways.

## **Habitat for Humanity Opportunities - Update**



For many years, Redeemer has participated in a group of different faith communities called with Fairfax Interfaith Coalition for Habitat. Member churches (and other faith groups) provided money donations to Habitat of Northern Virginia, and in turn Habitats reserved build day slots for FICH members – typically 10 per build day – approximately once a month. After an extended break due to Covid, Habitat is busy on a number of new building projects, and a lot of other updates as well. This includes the merger of Habitat-NOVA and Habitat-DC, with a new name "Habitat for Humanity of Washington, D.C. & Northern Virginia, Inc." (Habitat DC-NOVA). Habitat DC-NOVA was also the recipient of a substantial grant from philanthropist MacKenzie Scott, and it now has a number of build projects pending throughout the Washington, D.C. area.

Pre-Covid, the build days were often on weekdays and Redeemer did not have many members sign up to help. With the new opportunities available to anyone who would like to support Habitat build projects - no experience necessary – the Social Outreach Team has decided to end its membership in FICH at this time. This does not preclude you from volunteering for Habitat. If you are interested, you can find information here. 






#### Women's Prayer Group Tuesdays at 9:30 am


