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A Message from Pastor Sandy Kessinger



June of 2025 Prayers of Thanksgiving

In Ephesians 1:15-23, Paul offers a carefully crafted prayer to the church. It starts with words of thanksgiving and then proceeds to ask God to give the people a spirit of wisdom and revelation so that they may know the hope of his calling, the riches of his blessings, and the greatness of his power. As we close out this chapter in our journey together, let me offer a similar prayer for all of you who are part of the Lutheran Church of the Redeemer.

Dear Redeemer,

I know of your faith and your love for all people. I witnessed it all the time when together we lived out our mission statement to share the love of Christ with the greatest number of people. I witnessed it when together we shared it with those who are part of our faith community and those who reside beyond our church walls. We never stopped thinking of new ways to reach out to help the most vulnerable. We never stopped wanting to be there for others as God is ever so present for us. We never stopped welcoming all people and respecting them for who God created them to be.

I have also been a direct recipient of your faith and love. As much as I have done my best to care for you, you have reciprocated a hundredfold. We have worked side-by-side to bring the good news of Jesus Christ to those who hunger and thirst. We have studied the Word of God and have seen it come alive for us in new and awesome ways. In our worship and in our studies and in our outreach, we have walked together for these past thirteen and a half years. You have loved me as much (if not more) than I have loved you.

In my prayers I will ask God to give you a spirit of wisdom and revelation as we all transition to a new path forward. I will ask God to give you an open heart to receive the new interim pastor and when the time is right for a newly-called pastor. I will ask God to help you decide what kind of church you want to be in the future to address the changing needs of our community. In this kind of discernment, it will take courage to let go of the past and to embrace an unknown future.

And I ask that you keep me in your prayers as well. I have lived these past thirty years preaching and teaching and presiding over the sacraments. Fortunately for retired pastors, there are plenty of opportunities to be able to continue to do what we are called to do and still make time for our families and, in my case, to be out in the mission field more. I am excited to see where the Holy Spirit will lead me. My past experiences with Lutheran Disaster Response, mission trips with Youth Works, and just a general desire to help people one person at a time has given me a foundation by which to explore new opportunities.

I am most grateful that although I will no longer be at Redeemer as your called pastor, we will forever be connected by our love for God in Christ and our shared mission to spread the gospel in a variety of forms. With the eyes of our hearts enlightened, we will all know the hope that comes from a loving God who only wants the best for all of us.

We have all experienced the richness of God's blessings already. I was blessed every time I shared a meal with you, every time we had a conversation, every time we laughed together, and every time we cried together. I was blessed with so many holy moments and God moments (too numerous to count). So I know that there will be even more blessings in your future and in mine. I know that even though we will be working in different parts of God's kingdom, there will be even more ways that we can be a blessing to others. It is through the blessings of God and our collective love for God and each other that will keep us together.

As June 22 quickly comes upon us, may we all bow our knees before God in Christ. May we rejoice in the way God molded us together over my tenure at Redeemer. May we be forever grateful for the way that God was so visibly present with us.

Now to him who by the power at work within us is able to accomplish abundantly far more than all we can ask or imagine, to him be glory in the church and in Christ Jesus, forever and ever. Amen.

Minutes: May 12, 2025, Meeting of Congregation Council RLC Conference Room and via Zoom

Call to order. Karen Miller called the meeting to order at 7:39 PM.

Opening Devotions. PSK opened with prayer.

<u>Approval of Minutes</u>. Minutes from the meeting were previously approved by email.

Adoption of Agenda. The agenda, as emailed in advance of the meeting, was approved by the Council.

<u>Senior Pastor Report</u>. Pastor Kessinger submitted her report via email in advance of the meeting. Holy Week, the development of bulletins and sermons, and overall pastoral care of members has been PSK's primary focus this past month as her retirement date approaches .Additionally, PSK worked closely with families in preparation of four funerals and a wedding that will all take place in May.

Executive Committee Summary. The Executive Committee met on May 9 and talked about items on tonight's agenda.

<u>**Treasurer's Report</u>**. Steve Bott presented the Financial Report. Redeemer's expenses are over income by \$25,181 year-todate. Contributions have dipped in April, though the number of contributors remained constant.</u>

Discussion Item: McLean Day Outreach. The annual McLean Day is a significant opportunity to put out our new Welcome Statement, to remind people about the service we provide via Redeemer Renaissance, to talk about who we are, and to invite the community to join us in worship and faith formation. It is scheduled for May 17, 2025. Redeemer typically has a booth at the McLean Day site and provides parking and shuttle service at the church. Spots are still open for parking lot coverage, and PSK offered to send out an email encouraging members to sign up for a slot. Karen Miller noted that it would be beneficial to start planning more in advance for McLean Day 2026.

Discussion Item: Community Picnic in Late Summer. Council discussed prior experience with organizing an annual church picnic and noted the value of having a designated volunteer or group of volunteers to organize it. It was proposed that August or early September would be a good time to organize a picnic for the entire Redeemer and Redeemer Renaissance communities. Council was asked to think about friend groups or a volunteer who would be available to take this on.

Discussion Item: Proposed Welcome Banner. Karen Miller emailed in advance of the meeting a copy of a proposed welcome banner to display at the church entrance. The council reviewed the content and discussed the timing of the installation.

Tyler Posey made the motion to display the banner as presented and have it installed prior to the arrival of the Interim Pastor. Sabine Detweiler seconded the motion. The motion was approved unanimously by Council.

Discussion Item: Faith Formation Coordinator. Karen Miller reported that given the extensive time commitment involved, the Executive Council has recommended that it be a paid position. Council encouraged EC members to review the budget and consult with the outgoing Faith Formation Coordinator to establish the details and report back at the next meeting for consideration and approval.

Discussion Item: Confirmation Teacher(s). Council discussed general options for identifying a Confirmation Teacher or a team of Confirmation teachers. Ideas included checking with parents of confirmands, consulting with the Interim Pastor, or drawing on parents involved with the youth program. PSK will provide Karen with a list of names for consideration.

Discussion Item: Interim Pastor Meeting Preparations. Council will meet with the Synod's recommendation for Interim Pastor at 7 pm on May 13. Karen Miller emailed the candidate's Core Personal Discernment Profile and asked Council to review it in advance of the meeting with the candidate.

Discussion Item: Summer Council Schedule. It was decided that Council will meet both in July and August in the summer of 2025.

<u>Ministry Reports and Action Item: Endowment Committee</u>. Gene Morrow presented on behalf of the Endowment Committee. The Endowment Committee proposes a contribution of \$4,000 to organizations in the Buffalo, NY area associated with Youth Works. Redeemer's summer youth trip will be in communities in Buffalo, and this contribution will provide additional support to the area.

Gene Morrow made the motion to support the Endowment Committee's proposal. Sabine Detweiller seconded the motion. The motion was unanimously approved by Council.

New Business: None.

<u>**Close with Prayer**</u>. Council closed with the Lord's Prayer.

Construction Project Updates from May

Construction will start in mid-August with the renovation work beginning in the old classroom wing first. That portion should be completed in early December. Then the office wing will be closed for renovation and staff members will be moved into the new classrooms temporarily. Once the office wing renovations are completed, staff will move back into their offices. All of the interior work for both wings should be completed by the end of March. As areas and hallways are closed, signs will go up to direct members and visitors to any temporary offices and through the rest of the building.

We are still working with the County to get approval on our outdoor plans for the renovated Natural Play Area and the new Columbarium. The County has changed one of their requirements and we now need to modify the way we handle and release stormwater. Our civil engineers are working on a solution. We are planning to begin the outdoor construction in November/December and finish both areas in the spring. We will have a better idea on the timeline once we have approval to proceed from the County.

Last year, we entered into discussions with the owners of the office park next door. There was an issue of water flowing from their parking lot across our property. They agreed to make improvements to their storm drain configuration and recently completed that work. While we still need to improve the storm water flow from within our own property borders, their improvement will reduce the volume of water involved. Our new Natural Play Area construction work will better handle this reduced flow and help make Redeemer's playground less wet and muddy for our Preschool, After-school, and Summer Camp kids.

As you think about how you can support Redeemer's renovation and expansion plans through the capital campaign, please consider one of the tax-advantaged giving options. The giving of appreciated stocks or mutual funds will help minimize your capital gain taxes. Also, the giving of IRA Required Minimum Distributions (RMDs) can also lower your taxable income. 

Please Help Care for Our Neighbors Support Redeemer's Little Food Pantry

The Little Pantry's purpose is to provide access to food 24/7, without qualifications or judgment, for our neighbors in need.

There has been an increase in the use of the Little Pantry, so it needs to be filled daily.

Items may be placed 24/7 in the bin marked "Little Pantry" on the Share cart outside Door 10, or directly into the Little Pantry (parking lot on Westmoreland St.)

Guidelines: no glass containers; all items need to be shelf stable (nothing perishable); healthy food with nutritional value

Items most needed:

- canned tuna, chicken
- canned meat stews, fruit, vegetables, soups, beans
- small plastic jars of peanut butter
- pasta, crackers, cereal, macaroni and cheese



Winter Scarf Drive

HOOKS AND NEEDLES ONCE AGAIN: The prayer shawl group will be hosting the annual winter scarf drive once more. Please consider crocheting or knitting a winter scarf for the Women of N Street Ministries. Gently used and newly purchased winter scarves are also welcome.

Pick up a "scarf in a bag" kit in the Crossroads. Each bag contains enough yarn to knit or crochet a scarf and directions for the project. Take a bag home and enjoy a "hands on " project over the summer months. Directions for both crocheted and knitted scarves are included, or use any pattern of your choosing. There is plenty of yarn available in the yarn closet for artisans to use as well. Contact the church office to arrange to visit the yarn closet.

Collection boxes for the scarves will be put out in September, and the drive will end in early October.

The scarves will go to the women being served by N Street ministries. Redeemer has had a long term relationship with N Street; a ministry that helps homeless women in DC with a wide range of programs that foster independence. The prayer shawl group meets the first and third Thursday of most months. We do take a break during July and August. The hybrid (Zoom and in person) meetings run from 10:30 to noon. All are welcome. We hope you enjoyed seeing all of our creative quilts in April and May when they were blessed. As you can see, we've been busy! Obviously, we love our mission.

The Quilting Group meets on the first and third Wednesdays of each month from 9:00-11:30 am in Fellowship Hall. We are a small group of five ladies on a mission to share our love of sewing. We continue to support Partner for Surgery in Guatemala along with Project Linus (which we started supporting in 2024). Our quilts are various sizes based upon Project Linus guidelines: minimum sizes: 36" x 36" for baby blankets, 42" x 60" for children's blankets, and 45" x 72" for teen blankets, in addition to fleece blankets.

Project Linus supports local Fairfax County organizations such as Ronald McDonald House, Tragedy Assistance Program for Survivors (TAPS), kids who have lost a military service parent, local emergency situations and national emergency situations when a call for assistance is received, and INOVA Hospital, to name a few.

Partner for Surgery, Guatemala provides medical and surgical care in rural Guatemala, helping impoverished Guatemalan children and families living in remote locations. Our quilts are hand delivered by Frank Petersen. Additionally, we provide handmade tote bags and bears for the children.

Additionally, this year, we "teamed" up with the Prayer Shawl Group to make fleece blankets for Project Linus. The Quilting Group purchased the fleece, rotary skip blade and prepped the fleece for the crocheters to put an edge on. Additionally, any leftover fleece from the blankets was made into scarves to support the Prayer Shawl's scarf drive later this year. The Quilting Group will deliver both quilts and blankets made by Prayer Shawl to the Project Linus drop off location.

Our group is always looking for assistance, and we welcome new sewers into our small group. If you are unable to attend in person, we can provide you with supplies to design a quilt or even a bundled set (quilt top, batting, backing fabric, and yarn) to make at your leisure at home. Other ways to help include monetary donations; fabric, thread, and other sewing/quilting items are welcome. When donating money, please designate it for the "Quilting Group." Monetary donations will go toward the purchase of much-needed batting, fabric, thread, and any other supplies as needed.
