A Message from Pastor Sandy Kessinger

April of 2025 100 Days

I am writing this article with only 100 days left in our ministry together. At some point, things will slow down but not yet. In my article last month, I talked about the invitation we received to share an Iftar dinner with members of the Muslim community. The event was held on March 12 by about eighty people. Here is a post from the American Turkish Friendship Association that summarizes the event well:

On March 12, we had the honor of being hosted by the Lutheran Church of the Redeemer for a meaningful interfaith iftar, where nearly 80 guests gathered to share the spirit of Ramadan – a time of reflection, gratitude, and community.

The evening began with a warm welcome and a guided tour of the church, offering us a chance to learn more about their faith and traditions. Prayers were shared, fostering a deep sense of unity, and we engaged in meaningful conversations about the significance of Ramadan as a month of fasting, empathy, and spiritual renewal.

Breaking bread together reminded us of the power of dialogue, understanding, and friendship across different communities. We are deeply grateful to Pastor Sandy Kessinger and all our friends at the Lutheran Church of the Redeemer for their generous hospitality and to everyone who joined us in making this night so special. May we continue to build bridges, strengthen friendships, and celebrate the values that unite us all. Thank you for a truly unforgettable evening!

It became a bit of an emotional night for most (if not all) of us. People came forward thanking us for being open to their invitation. Some spoke of how they dreamed of such a day when we could break bread together with love and respect. At a time in our world when we are so divided, the unity we felt that night was palpable.

On the way home that evening I reflected on the events of the night and the value of sharing a meal together. In my almost thirty years of ministry, a gathering for an Iftar dinner was a first for me. Seeds were planted that I hope will continue to bear fruit in the future and beyond my tenure at Redeemer. This experience, and others like it, remind me of the *Parable of the Sower* that is found in Luke 8. In the parable, it is the job of the Sower to toss out seeds with little thought of where the seeds might land. As the Sower moved on there would be others who would follow to make sure the seeds were tended to with care. Some will not take root but others will flourish and grow.

When the council met with the Assistant to the Bishop, Pastor Sarah Garrett Krey, it was clear in their brief interaction that Redeemer has many gifts and resources to share. During this time of pastoral transition, Pastor Sarah encouraged the council and our congregation to remain in prayer. We are to stay in the moment to enjoy these closing days <u>and</u> we can also be in prayer about the future. Pastor Sarah reminded the council that somewhere out there rests your new pastor. We can pray that the pastor will be guided by the Holy Spirit to this house of worship.

In the meanwhile, the congregation will need to be patient with the process. Calling a new pastor is never a quick thing. There is quite a bit of work to be done even before you start to interview pastoral candidates.

When you read the council minutes, you will see in broad terms the procedure that you will follow. It will become more defined as time goes on.

I am starting to list the things that I currently do that will need to be picked up by volunteers. It will help the interim pastor to have continuity and the extra support. I want to thank those who have already stepped up to do such things as developing messages for our signboard and to be the contact for those who come to worship from the Sunrise Senior Living facility. We will need everyone's active participation in the coming months. For example, volunteers will be needed to coordinate the Faith Formation ministry. We will need teachers for the Confirmation class. If you are able and willing to help in any capacity, then please contact me.

100 days is not a long time. Above all else, I hope that in this time together we will come, first and foremost, on a Sunday morning to worship together. We still have much to learn from each other and it happens when we hear the Word of God and share in the Lord's Supper. It is the best time each week to connect in praise and thanksgiving to God. We still have time for Bible studies. On Wednesdays (April 23 – May 28) the morning sessions will uncover some of the oldest documents written that mirror some of our Biblical stories. The sessions in the evening will explore the prophet, Ezekiel. It will complete our study of the different books of the Bible since my arrival in 2012.

We still have time to be together. Each day will be a blessing to me – from God – through all of you.

<u>Call to order.</u> Karen Miller called the meeting to order at 7:30 PM and the Council members introduced themselves to Pastor Sarah Garrett Krey.

<u>Opening Devotions</u>. PSK led devotions with Prayer for Discernment followed by a reading of Luke 4:1-13. The Council was asked to consider the potential temptations during the period of pastoral transition at Redeemer and mentioned the following: the temptation to rush to a decision, to feel frustrated with the process, to expect a new pastor to be a replica of PSK, and to allow personal views to dominate the process and overshadow the needs of the entire congregation.

Approval of Minutes. Minutes from the meeting were previously approved by email.

Adoption of Agenda. The agenda, as emailed in advance of the meeting, was approved by the Council.

<u>Discussion with Pastor Sarah Garrett Krey.</u> Pastor Sarah Garrett Krey briefed Council through the steps of the pastoral transition: the selection of an Interim pastor, the call process, and the eventual election by the Congregation of a new pastor. These steps are outlined in detail in the "Healthy Transitions Guide" on the ELCA-Metro DC Synod website.

Pastor SGK shared the following observations based on her experience of guiding other congregations and on her familiarity with Redeemer:

- The recent survey conducted by the Congregation was an important first step in the transition. To date 45 responses have been collected and reviewed by Council.
- Thanks to its robust ministry activities, secure finances, and current capital improvement plans, Redeemer is well positioned to present an attractive Ministry Site Profile which will appeal to candidates during the call process.
- There is no defined timeline for the transition. SGK has worked with congregations that have taken as little as a few months and as long as a couple of years.
- It is not uncommon for membership to fluctuate during a pastoral transition.
- The ideal Interim Pastor is one who will support Redeemer's ongoing ministries and administrative proceedings and provides spiritual guidance to congregants while the Congregation (through a Transition Committee, Call Committee, and Council) work with the Synod to identify a pool of candidates and issue a call. Compensation for the Interim Pastor varies, depending on the experience of the individual selected.
- The optimal Call Committee is one that represents the diversity of the congregation. The number of members on the Call Committee (9) is outlined in our constitution.
- The most successful call process is one that is not rushed, and which prioritizes finding the best fit for the congregation over against filling a position as quickly as possible.

Before leaving the meeting, Pastor SGK reaffirmed the Synod's commitment to guiding Redeemer through this process and encouraged us to reach out to her with questions.

Senior Pastor Report. Pastor Kessinger submitted her report via email in advance of the meeting. Her report detailed Connections through pastoral care, Connections through ministries of the congregation, Connections through meetings, Connections through synod, Connections through community, and additional notes such as the Muslim/Christian Dinner on March 12 and the remaining Lenten Services and dinners. There were no questions from Council.

Executive Committee Summary. The Executive Committee met on February 28 and talked about items on tonight's agenda. The position of at-large member on the Executive committee is vacant, and Karen Miller invited council members to consider joining and to contact her for more information.

Treasurer's Report. Steve Bott presented the Financial Report. He noted that Redeemer currently has a surplus of \$31,000 and praised Sara Nail, Redeemer's finance coordinator, for her guidance and attention. It was noted that the MMEC Pastoral Support Fund represents restricted funds to be held in reserve if needed for our pastoral staff as protection from unforeseen budget shortfalls.

Construction Project & Capital Campaign Updates from March

At this point, it looks like construction will start in mid-August with the renovation work beginning in the classroom wing first. That portion should be completed in November allowing us to then reoccupy that space. Next the office wing will be closed, and renovation work will start there with planned completion in February. These timeframes from the contractors are longer than we had hoped for, so we will be working with the construction team to see where the dates can be improved without significantly increasing costs.

In order to complete our construction project, we are planning to have a new mortgage of \$1.6M. Members have asked how that compares to what Redeemer has done in the past. Prior to when Pastor Kessinger was called to Redeemer, we had two mortgages totaling \$2.3M. The monthly principal and interest payments were approximately \$15K per month. We paid off the first mortgage 7 years early, leaving a \$10K monthly mortgage payment remaining, which was then paid off 6 years early. Therefore, we have handled larger obligations in the past and have paid them off ahead of schedule.

Redeemer's Beyond Measure Capital Campaign for our construction project has received 49% (\$1.5M) of the pledges needed towards our goal of \$3.2M. Plus, an additional 6% (\$196K) has been given directly outside of the pledge process. Making a gift towards the campaign is a great opportunity to honor someone important to you and your family or to just give thanks for all the blessings in your life. Of course, all financial gifts are gratefully received and appreciated with or without a pledge.

Message from our Prayer Partnership Pastor Zhanibek Batenov at Evangelical Lutheran Church of St. Mary in Ulyanovsk, Russia

Dear sister in Christ, Sandy Kessinger!

I am cordially greeting you from Ulyanovsk. For us, probably just like for you, and for all the other Lutherans all over the world, December was a hectic month. The main thing that happened was, of course, the festive Christmas services. In addition, there were concerts dedicated to Christmas by children's and adult choirs, organ concerts, and a Christmas fair. I was especially inspired by an event in our Church with the participation of children's choirs from a nearby children's art school.

In January there were fewer plans, but there were also concerts and excursions in the church. In addition, it was possible to conduct a seminar on the topic "Traditional Protestant theology through the prism of spiritual chants." The seminar was conducted by Anton Tikhomirov, Doctor of Theology, rector of the St. Petersburg Lutheran Theological Seminary. The seminar participants were from my congregation and from that in Samara.

In addition, over the past two months 6 new people have come to the congregation. We recently started a confirmation training course and 8 people are taking it. I plan to confirm them at Easter. Plans for this year also include spring and summer events, for example, children's holiday camps, kayaking trips, and open-air activities. I am also planning several more educational seminars for active community members.

A piece of particularly good news for me is that at the beginning of this year my assistant Nikolai who translates all my letters to you enrolled as a distance learner in the St. Petersburg Lutheran Theological Seminary. I also want to share with you that since January I have started learning English in group classes twice a week. I hope that in time I will be able to write letters without the help of a translator and Google.

I'm asking for your prayers for all our plans and our ministry.

April Community Service- Soap & Toiletries Drive for SHARE of McLean



Counting our Blessings during Lent

If you've not had time yet to count your blessings in Lent, it's not too late to start. You can use the Lenten Blessings calendar provided by Redeemer's Social Outreach Ministry: you can find it here or pick up a copy from the table in Crossroads.

Each day you can answer the question and give thanks. For example, "How many umbrellas are in your house? Give thanks for rain to make gardens grow!"

Once a week there is an "action" related to a "question". The action is to donate a specific item to an organization/activity sponsored by Redeemer; you can put the item in the box on the table in Crossroads. For example: After answering a question about how many pans are in your kitchen, you're encouraged to give a small bottle of dish soap for Homestretch, an organization in Falls Church that helps "homeless families with children living in Virginia to attain permanent housing and self-sufficiency by giving them the skills, knowledge, and hope they need to become productive participants in the community."

Another way you can help any of the five organizations named on the calendar is to keep a running total of the answer to each day's question and donate that number of pennies, nickels, dimes, quarters, etc., to one of the organizations named in the calendar. Write a check to Redeemer and put the name of the group in the Memo line.

Partner For Surgery – Donations Needed

Partner for Surgery is an organization which helps people in remote areas of Guatemala obtain life-changing surgery (e.g, cleft palate repair for babies). Founded by our own Frank and Linda Peterson, thousands of Guatemalans have been served. The Prayer Shawl Ministry and Project Linus

The Prayer Shawl Ministry usually meets on the first and third Thursday of the month from 10:30 to noon (virtual option as well) in the library. We have an exciting effort underway - knitting and crocheting baby and toddler blankets for Project Linus! Project Linus supports any child aged 0 - 18 that is in distress due to illness, injury, or traumatic event in their life by giving them a warm, soft blanket. They have a great need for baby and toddler blankets especially.

Just a small sampling of the organizations the Fairfax County Chapter of Project Linus supports:

- Ronald McDonald House, D.C.
- TAPS (Tragedy Assistance Program for Survivors...kids who have lost a parent in military service)
- Local emergency situations and national emergency situations that put out a call for assistance
- INOVA Mt Vernon Pediatric Emergency Room

Knitted and crocheted blanket requirements

- Handmade-only blankets made with new, washable materials from non-smoking homes. Ends should be secure as blankets for hospitalized children may undergo daily washing.
- Soft acrylic yarn, 100% cotton, or a soft cotton/acrylic blend (no wool, please!)
- Baby 36" x 36" plus or minus an inch
- Toddler 40" x 50" plus or minus an inch
- Free yarn and pattern are available in Crossroads. Knitters and crocheters can provide their own yarn and/or pattern as well.

Quilting Group

The Quilting Group meets on the first and third Wednesdays of each month from 9:00-11:30 am in Fellowship Hall. We are a small group of five ladies on a mission to share our love of sewing. We continue to support Partner for Surgery in Guatemala along with Project Linus (which we started supporting in 2024). Our quilts are various sizes based upon Project Linus guidelines: minimum sizes: 36" x 36" for baby blankets, 42" x 60" for children's blankets, and 45" x 72" for teen blankets, in addition to fleece blankets. Project Linus supports local Fairfax County organizations such as Ronald McDonald House, Tragedy Assistance Program for Survivors (TAPS) kids who have lost a military service parent, local emergency situations and national emergency situations when a call for assistance is received, and INVOA Hospital, to name a few. Partner for Surgery, Guatemala provides medical and surgical care in rural Guatemala, helping impoverished Guatemalan children and families living in remote locations. Our quilts are hand delivered by Frank Petersen. Additionally, we provide handmade tote bags and bears for the children.

Additionally, this year, we "teamed" up with the Prayer Shawl Group to make fleece blankets for Project Linus. The Quilting Group purchased the fleece and rotary skip blade and prepped the fleece for the crocheters to put an edge on. Additionally, any leftover fleece was made into scarves to support the Prayer Shawl's scarf drive later this year. The Quilting Group will deliver both quilts and blankets made by Prayer Shawl to the Project Linus drop off in Fairfax.

Our group is always looking for assistance and we welcome new sewers into our small group. If you are unable to attend in person, we can provide you with supplies to design a quilt or even a bundled set (quilt top, batting, backing fabric, and yarn) to make at your leisure at home. Other ways to help are to donate fabric or even monetary donations. If donating money, please indicate it is for the "Quilting Group." Monetary donations will go towards the purchase of much-needed batting, fabric, thread, and any other supplies needed.
