Getting Started

What do you need?

How much will it cost?

Where will you buy it?

- If buying something, make sure that you get a quote from a qualified representative, and not just website prices.
- Make sure that the quote will be good for at least 6 months with no special sales or deals included.
- Double check to ensure that you can buy the grant items from a school-approved vendor

Is your grant request large? If so, you may want to consider breaking it down and applying for matching grants with several organizations. You will also need to have a plan in place if only a portion of your grant is awarded.

If your grant is a program, make sure you have a budget break-down of where all of the funds will go and who they will go to.

Project Title

This can be the first thing or the last thing that you write, but it is one of the most important parts of your grant.

The following tips will help you write a great title:

- Use plain language
- Keep it short and avoid unnecessary words
- Use active, forward thinking verbs
- Avoid being generic
- Avoid punctuation and abbreviations

Start Gathering Information

- Most grants ask for a lot of information about all aspects of your organization, school district, and finances.
- Every grant is different and will want different information. Gather as much information at the beginning in order to save time when you find grants.
- This is the most time consuming part of grant writing.
- Be thorough and double check all of your information.
- Once all of the information is written and gathered, the grant writing process will simply be a matter of filling in the blanks.

Different Types of Grants

You need to be aware of the different types of grants and funding available to you.

- Teacher-centric grants these grants are for the TEACHER and not the school. Usually in the form of Donors Choose or Adopt a Classroom - these grants actually buy the supplies for you and ship them to you. They do not send you a check.
- School-centric grants these grants are the most common.
 These grants give you a check to spend on your students, and the items purchased stay at the school. They do not go with you.

Finding Grants

- Ask for help. Have any of your colleagues written a successful grant? Does your administration know where to find possible funding? Do you know of anyone who has received funding in a neighboring district? ASK!!
- Simply search the internet use keywords for your geographical area and types of funding that you are looking for (fine arts, STEM, etc.)



Writing the Grant

- If you struggle with writing, find a friend or colleague who would be willing to help
- Find writing examples that you can use to help guide your writing and ask to see a successfully written grant
- Do NOT copy someone else's work
- Have your curriculum specialist, administrator, or colleague help you make sure that your goals and objectives for your grant are written appropriately and are measurable.
- Be aware of the application process of each grant and if it is worth your time and energy
- Do not write yourself into a corner with your grant be aware of what happens to your grant items/money after you get it

Using Al

Al is a great resource to use when writing, but there some things to remember:

- Familiarize yourself with the program before using it to help you write
- Clearly articulate your project's goals, objectives, and specific information, because the more precise your instructions, the better the AI can assist you
- Al may not fully understand the context or nuances of your specific grant
- Always review and edit generated content to ensure accuracy and relevance
- Al's lack the human touch, so make sure that you personalize each response, don't copy it verbatim
- Do not copy an Al response without checking for plagiarism

Proofread

- Proofread before you submit!
- Have a colleague, friend, or administrator proof to make sure your work makes sense. It doesn't hurt to give this to as many people as possible to ensure that it is written correctly.
- Double check phone numbers, emails, and all contact information
- Be aware of all due dates! Don't rush to get something done - many grant foundations have two yearly dates, not just one

Now, do it again!

- Submit as many grant applications that you can
- Don't be afraid to try a grant that may not be a good fit
- The more you submit, the better the odds will be that you get awarded a grant
- Be patient! Some grants will take up to a year to be awarded
- Be aware of the application requirements. Some grants will not let you reapply immediately


Getting a Grant

You won't always get every grant you apply for, but once you do get a grant, make sure you follow your district and grant guidelines on how to spend the money.

- Every district is different, so double check with your district
 CFO about what to do next
- If the grant is a check, it will probably need to be turned in to your school business office - even if it has your name on it!
- Follow your district's purchasing guidelines when spending the grant money
- Make sure you spend the funds ONLY on what you wrote for on your grant

Celebrate!

- Make sure to share your accomplishment with your administrators!
- Acknowledge those foundations and companies who gave you money publicly
- Post on social media
- Contact your district media specialist or local news source to let them know of your accomplishment
- Show your grant money in action

What happens next?

Once you receive a grant, make sure that you follow up after the funds are spent.

- Most foundations will ask for an accounting of how you spent the funds. They will usually give you a specific timeline and a form to complete.
- Donors Choose asks for photos and an email to send out to donors
- All grants are different, but make sure that you fulfill all of your obligations so that you will be eligible for a grant from them the future.
