### **DEVOTIONS**



Read: Ecclesiastes 3:1-13.

The theme of Ecclesiastes is summed up in verse two of chapter one: "Vanity of vanities, says the Teacher, vanity of vanities! All is vanity." The Hebrew term for vanity is difficult to translate. It has the suggestion of something that doesn't last, like vapors that quickly escape. Our efforts, our toil, is rather inconsequential, leading to little real gain. We really don't grasp the ways of God, so there is a sense that we should enjoy the simple pleasures of life like eating, drinking, and engaging in daily activities. As we approach a new year, there is great wisdom from our biblical teacher in Ecclesiastes. Life provides a rich variety of experiences from good to bad, from joy to sorrow. We humans have not figured out what it all means. We wonder what God is up to. We enjoy what we can from the day and go to bed with gratitude. In Jesus, we see a simple directive leading us back to the basics: love God and love others. When we keep to such basic goals for life, we do well. All other pursuits feel like vanity and like vapors will disappear into thin air and be forgotten.

Discuss: How does a focus on the basics help you begin the New Year?

*Pray:* Dear God, as we look to the future, help us to hold on to what really matters, trusting in your wisdom and your steadfast love for us through Christ Jesus our Lord. Amen.
