7. Diane Samuel

Had you told me three years ago that I would be getting baptized today, I would have said not likely. Had you told me 10 years ago, I would have said No Way.

I was baptized as an infant and grew up in a family that attended church religiously (literally). If we could not make it to Sunday services, we knelt and prayed the rosary. My family still talks about the Saturday night that there was an ice storm during the night and all the power was out on the farm. My dad had his hands full trying to care for the animals but my mom was determined that we would not miss church. She piled me and my 5 siblings into the family station wagon and off to church we went. Midway down a steep hill, we hit a patch of ice and the car flew out of

In spite of that, I don't recall God being invited into our lives or that our faith was god-centered so much as it was about following the rules of religion. When I married, my husband and I went to church semi-regularly but again never felt any sense of belonging or God. I finally completely gave up when the priest refused to baptize our younger son because we didn't attend church regularly enough. I was just done with church.

I completely stepped away from God and faith for most of my adult life. I'm not sure whether I stopped believing, because I'm not sure I ever truly believed in the first place. I started attending Cedarbrook about 5 years ago with the encouragement of my boyfriend Jim. He has always had a very strong faith, and I started going more to please him than anything.

I have always been a Christian for as long as I can remember. Then, before Christmas in 2014, my husband and I finally joined her at Cedarbrook and we loved it.

Since I felt an obligation to my Catholic church, and feared what people might say, I still took our boys to the 8:30 mass on Sunday at St. Mary's, and then Weston would join us for the 10:45 service at Cedarbrook. Easter of that year, we had to make a decision. We chose Cedarbrook, and I remember standing in church that Easter Sunday, and as the band started to play, I closed my eyes and heard God for the very first time in my life. I had been working through some anxiety in my life at the time, so surrounding myself with God loving women, and reading the bible together was the best place I could be.
