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United in Worship and Service



I'm so excited to share what our leadership has been working on. In September (2025), our Council agreed to kick off a brand new, spiritually focused initiative starting in January 2026. We've called it "United in Worship and Service."

Worship and Work Must Be One

When I hear those words, I immediately think of the Voices United hymn Worship the Lord, particularly that line that hits home every time: "worship and work must be one". As one Council member noted, "That is exactly what this whole project is about!"

We realized that sometimes the 'work' of running the church—all the administration, meetings, and reports—can feel separate from the spiritual heartbeat of our faith. We want to stop that! We are committed to transforming our Council and M&P (staff) meetings into genuinely inspirational and worshipful gatherings, making sure everything we do is guided by God's purpose.

For the Council, this initiative involves transforming standard functions, so they are United in Worship and Service by consciously applying biblical principles to governance. Specifically, we will be sharing reports as stories of God's leading and grace, mirroring the consistent practice of early believers who reported all that God had done through them. We will deepen our spiritual vitality by engaging in biblical-theological reflection on shared challenges, using **Scripture**, so that we may live a life worthy of the God and please God in every way". Furthermore, to guide decision-making, we will engage in prayerful discernment, adhering to the consistent call for devotion to prayer and striving to understand what God's will is so that the work of the church may be built up and our actions are done in the name of Jesus, giving thanks to God. The goal is to conduct our governance in a manner that serves God's people and promotes mutual edification, recognizing that we are Christ's servants entrusted with God's mysteries.

And, for our amazing United Church ministers—me included! We are carving out time for Sacred Companionship. This means dedicated retreats for rest, healing, and spiritual nourishment. It's a safe space where we can be vulnerable and honest, tackling that feeling of isolation.

Anchoring Ourselves in the 2035 Vision

Why is Siloam undertaking this shift? Because it completely supports the big-picture future strategy of the United Church, known as "Towards 2035." This vision calls for the UCC to become a resilient, inspired, and diverse community of disciples. By intentionally making sure our leaders are spiritually grounded and adaptive, we are making Siloam a stronger, more inspired congregation. This intentional focus helps us prioritize and continually reinvent our ministry. It's about focusing on the clear path forward, ensuring we become a resilient community equipped for the future.

Cooperation and Shared Learning

And that's where the "Service" part of our name comes in! The 2035 Vision stresses that cooperation and collaboration must be central to our future. We aren't keeping this goodness to ourselves. We are documenting our learning so we can share it with other communities of faith!

This journey is all about living that hymn line: "worship and work must be one." Please keep our Council, Staff, and Ministers in your prayers as we prepare for this transformative launch in January 2026!

Greetings, Siloam friends! Happy autumn from your Director of Music Blythe George.



Seed saving is important because it promotes food security by preserving diversity, adapting plants to the local climate, reduces dependence on commercial seed companies, fosters self-sufficiency, and preserves cultural heritage and genetic diversity for future generations.

We have planted a new orchard row along the back fence that has a better root system, so we are hoping the trees will take better and flourish.

We have harvested 1,070 lbs of food so far this season, and there is still produce in the garden!

445lbs of produce has been donated through the ELUCO, and we have donated 80lbs of produce to the Siloam Families we directly support. Donations will still continue throughout the winter! The remaining produce harvested from Siloam gets distributed to our community pop-up markets partners for direct distribution to individuals and families at no cost to them.


Siloam hosted 10 pop-up markets this year in the Arva Atrium, including a special Thanksgiving Honey & Produce market.

The Garbage We Produce

Canadians hold a record that I am not very proud of. We produce more garbage per person than any other country in the world. According to Canadian Geographic (Nov 2017), that's 720 kg per person, per year, which is about twice what is produced per capita in Japan and up to 10 times what is produced by a half dozen countries in Africa. How can that be, you say. We recycle – we invented the Blue Box! Well, there are a number of reasons for this statistic and for the fact that most of us are blissfully unaware of it. For one thing, it all takes place so easily and efficiently that we just don't think about what happens to our garbage once it leaves the house. We plop it down by the side of the road and soon it's out of sight (and out of mind).

Another reason is that, on average, Canadians are financially comfortable. Oxfam has estimated that the richest 10% of humans are responsible for about half of global "lifestyle consumption" emissions, while the poorest half of the world's population only emit 10% of these emissions. Then there is the fact that our economy is based on endless growth – manufacture, consume, discard (FYI - this is not a sustainable way of life).

The biggest problem, plain and simple, is that we buy too much stuff. Too much stuff we don't need, too much stuff for the sake of convenience, and too much stuff that's made to be used once then thrown away. So one of the most important ways we can create less garbage is to simply buy less stuff.

This is where we begin to talk about the 3R's: **Reduce, Reuse and Recycle.** Reduce is the most important. When we cut back, we buy less, we use less and consequently, we waste less. A few years back this was common practice. Unfortunately, we have developed into a society of "consumers". We have disposable this and single-use that, all for the sake of convenience. Many products are impossible to fix because they are supposed to be thrown out when they stop working. To top it off, we are constantly bombarded with media messages urging us to keep up with the latest fad and to try numerous "new and improved" products.

Stop and ask yourself some questions before you buy anything:

- Do you really need this item?
- Can you do without it?
- Can you purchase it second-hand or can you rent it?
- Is it a quality product that will give you years of service?
- What will happen to it when you are done with it?
- Can it be recycled?
- Can the packaging it comes in be recycled?
- Is it over-packaged?



Packaging makes up one third of household garbage, so this is an important consideration. Is there more packaging than product? This is often the case with single serving products. All those snacks, beverages, desserts, and microwave meals can add up to a lot of garbage. Instead, buy larger containers, then divide it up into smaller portions at home. At Bulk Barn you can bring your own containers and further reduce your packaging. Cook extra food and create your own microwave meals, then freeze them for future use.

When we reduce the amount of wasteful purchases we make we save in a number of ways. We save the raw materials and energy used to make the product (and its packaging) as well as the cost of sending it all to a landfill site when we dispose of it. It's all a matter of looking at things from a different perspective. We need to change ourselves from "consumers" to "conservers".
