






Where are Americans finding meaning in their lives if not in religion? Here is a study where the author argues that the things that get our attention have become our god.




Lenten Reflections on the Confession of Belhar, kerri N. Allen & Donald K. McKim, eds, (Witherspoon Press)


The Gift of Hard Things: Finding Grace in Unexpected Places, Mark Yaconelli, (Christian Audio)
