This massive pine beam and stone lodge captures the atmosphere of the grand park lodges built at the turn of the century. Salt Fork State Park Lodge is tucked away in the rolling hills of southeastern Ohio just a short drive from Cambridge, in Ohio's largest state park. The lush wooded surrounding boast miles of recreational trails, wildlife, and impressive views of the sparkling lake.

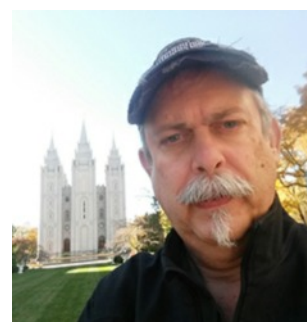


Speaker Bio's
