Why is the COVID-19 vaccine important?

Getting the vaccine will protect yourself, your family and the people around you. The vaccine will also help stop the spread of COVID-19 in our community and end the pandemic.



How safe is it?

The U.S. vaccine safety system makes sure that all vaccines, including the recently FDA-authorized COVID-19 vaccines, are safe. The clinical trials for both vaccines studied thousands of people and showed that the vaccine is safe.



How it works

The vaccine works by teaching your body how to protect you from getting sick from COVID-19. For the vaccine to work you must get two doses. Pfizer's vaccine must be taken 21 days apart, while Moderna's must be taken 28 days apart. This means you are not immune to COVID-19 until after the second dose of the vaccine.



No COVID-19 in the vaccine

The vaccine does not have any COVID-19 in it. The vaccine teaches your body how to protect you from COVID-19. The vaccine will not make you test positive for COVID-19.



Don't worry - you're not sick

Both the Moderna and Pfizer vaccines can cause side effects. These can include injection site pain in the arm, low fever, muscle pain, chills and headache. Don't worry, you're not sick; it's just your body learning how to protect you from the virus. Symptoms normally go away after a day or two and you can continue normal daily activities.
