The Lenten Season

Ash Wednesday, February 17 this year, is the beginning of the Lent-Easter-Pentecost-cycle of the Christian year. Each year, Christians worldwide attend church services centered on the liturgical act known as the imposition of ashes. The marking of ashes in the shape of a cross on the foreheads of believers as a reminder of mortality and belonging is how Christians begin the forty-day journey of Lent leading to Easter and ultimately the Day of Pentecost. For some churches, this time of Lent begins on the eve of Ash Wednesday, known as Shrove Tuesday, Mardi Gras, or Fat Tuesday, where Christians party for one last day and clean out the pantry as fasting (one of the spiritual disciplines during Lent) begins on Ash Wednesday.

Ash Wednesday, usually begins with a service where we recognize our mortality, repent of our sins, and return to our loving God. We recognize life as a precious gift from God, and we return our lives toward Jesus Christ. We may make resolutions and commit to change our lives over the next forty days so that we might be more like Christ.

In an Ash Wednesday service, usually a minister marks the sign of the cross on people's foreheads, using ashes. This year due to Covid, individuals will be given a small container with ashes and make the mark of the cross on their forehead. While the ashes remind us of our mortality and sin, the cross reminds us of Jesus' resurrection (life after death) and forgiveness. It is a powerful nonverbal way that we can experience God's forgiveness and renewal as we return to Jesus. Ash Wednesday is one of the few times when followers of Jesus are marked in a visible way.

As we begin our Lenten journey let's keep our eyes focused on Jesus who " humbled himself and became obedient to the point of death, even death on a cross" (Phillipians 2:8)

Prayer: "Almighty God, you have created us out of the dust of the earth. Grant that these ashes may be to us a sign of our mortality and penitence, so that we may remember that only by your gracious gift are we given everlasting life; through Jesus Christ our Savior. Amen."

Affirmation From I Timothy (United Methodist Hymnal)

"There is one God and there is one mediator, Christ Jesus, who came as a ransom for all, to whom we testify. This saying is sure and worthy of full acceptance: That Jesus Christ came into the world to save sinners, and was manifested in the flesh, vindicated in the Spirit, seen by angels, proclaimed among the nations, believed in throughout the world, taken up in glory. Great indeed is the mystery of the gospel. Amen."
