#### *Jennifer Thompson, Crime Survivor*

Ms. Thomson is a crime survivor from North Carolina, whose case resulted in a DNA-based exoneration and prisoner release 11 years after the original crime and conviction. Ms. Thompson is also the Founder of Healing Justice and co-author of *Picking Cotton: Our Memoir of Injustice and Redemption*.

#### *Andrea Harrison, Victim Family Member*

Ms. Harrison is the surviving family member of a murder victim from New Jersey, Jacqueline Harrison. The person convicted of killing Jacqueline was released 18 years later based on DNA evidence.

#### *Katie Monroe, Executive Director, Healing Justice*

Ms. Monroe is an attorney and an expert in cases involving post-conviction claims of innocence and exonerations. She led the OVC-funded project and creation of new resources.
