Turtles continue to saunter to the finish line

NISSWA — Wednesday, July 20, was no special holiday, but that didn't stop throngs of people from crowding the turtle racing track.

The nearly 60-year tradition of racing turtles in Nisswa is alive

and well and attracting spectators from California or farther. Participants choose a bucket with a small amount of water and a turtle, place the turtles on a yellow line on the circular race track and watch them race at turtle speed to the finish line.

The event, which begins with

registration at 1 p.m. and races at 2 p.m. every Wednesday, featured more than 300 racers on July 20 alone.

Central Lakes Rotary event seeks to help combat trafficking

PINE RIVER — The Rotary Ends Human Trafficking Concert in Pine River is just around the corner.

In recent years, Rotary International, the largest service club in the world, has undertaken a new challenge: ending human trafficking. To that end, the Central Lakes Rotary Club chose the rural Pine River Lakes Music and Events Park to host a concert to help end human trafficking. The event is slated Friday-Sunday, Aug. 12-14.

The goal of the con-

cert is to raise \$15,000-\$20,000 that will go toward agencies that combat human trafficking, including local agencies. The event and its funds will also help to raise awareness of human trafficking globally and locally. If all goes as planned, this will be the first of ongoing REHT festivals.

The 2022 inaugural REHT festival has a line-up of nine musicians: 32 Below, Adelaide, Ayiesha Woods, Corey Meding & Brothers, Kent Dudley and Bended Knee, Plumb, Remedy Drive, The Rush Tribute Project and

Tim Engebraaten.

In addition to bands, there will be guest speakers: Dawn Heath-Fiedler, president of Join the Movement Events Inc.; Pequot Lakes Police Chief Eric Klang; Shantel Dudley and Stacy Schaffer, founder and executive director of the 31:8 Project.

The Lakes Music and Events Park has room for over 110 powered campsites and 100 primitive campsites. The concert area is 95,000 square feet. There is a permanent food court, permanent stage and picnic tables.

Ticket prices range from an \$80 three-day pass to a \$20 teen price (before Aug. 1). Camping ranges from \$20 a night for a primitive site to \$120 for an electric site for three days.

CROSSLAKE — Ron Manger, Fifty Lakes, will present a program on criminal activity in the early days of the Brainerd lakes area as part of the Crosslake Historical Society Back Porch program.

"Murder, Kidnapping, Robbery and Mayhem in the North Country" will start at 7 p.m. Wednesday, July 27, at the Crosslake Historic Log Village.

Manger's stories include a 1937 kidnapping by a young Crosby/Ironton man seeking fame through crime, a murder in Crosslake by a local man and the infamous Brainerd bank robbery.

Manger, a historian, has evidence of other misdeeds that took place in the north country and will explain the process of how he tracked down the information.
