Kingdom of God, not kingdom of institution

As a multi-vocational pastor, it's been over a year since my last pastorate.

While away from the institutional affairs of the church, I have taken time to discern not only the next steps in my own ministry, but the larger issues that are at play in the greater Christian church.

In doing so, I have come to understand more about the movement that Jesus actually began, and it's not the establishment of the institutional Christian church.

In John 3:1-3, Jesus meets Nicodemus, who states, "Rabbi, we know that you are a teacher who has come from God; for no one can do these signs that you do apart from the presence of God."

Jesus answered him, "Very truly, I tell you, no one can see the kingdom

of God without being born anew (or from above)."

This is not Jesus telling us that we need to be "born again" by accepting Jesus as our Lord and Savior, which often means ascribing to a set of doctrines and belonging to a church.

But rather, Jesus is trying to tell us that being born anew, to see the kingdom of God, is a way of changing how we see the world around us. It's a renewed vision that we gain by following the way of Jesus.

Jesus taught that the kingdom of God was

already here, we just needed the eyes to see it. Those who followed Jesus and early church learned the way to open themselves up to the kingdom of God that is present on earth.

The early disciples were individuals who came together around this social and spiritual vision of Jesus.

The vision of Jesus wasn't about building institutions. It was simple: Love one another, just as we have been loved. That is how the world will know that we are disciples of Jesus. (John 13:34-35)

When Paul wrote that we are the body of Christ as the Christian community, he meant that we literally are the incarnation of Christ here on earth. We are the hands and feet of Jesus, called to go out into the world and share the good news that he brings.

It was not about Jesus establishing the church as an institution. It was about how Jesus can open people's eyes to the true kingdom of God and experience it for themselves.

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I am not trying to say that the institutional church isn't important. Communities of faith are central places for Christians to gather and share in community. There are many benefits in belonging to a church and participating in corporate worship.

But, if you look into the Book of Acts, you can see how the early church was formed by individuals coming together under this radical vision of Jesus, working to make the kingdom of God known to others.

It wasn't about establishing an institution that was a top down system of power and control, or even a system of particular ritual practices, but rather a grassroots gathering of people who believed in Jesus and the social and spiritual vision that he

taught.

To be born again is to see the truth of Jesus' message and promise of hope, love and peace to those who follow him.

True Christianity is not about belonging to a particular church institution. What could be more Christian than actually following the lessons of Jesus?

The Christian faith then calls us to go out and make the kingdom of God known to the world that desperately needs it through acts of kindness and love.

That is how together as Christians we overturn the kingdoms of darkness and make the kingdom of God a reality for all.
