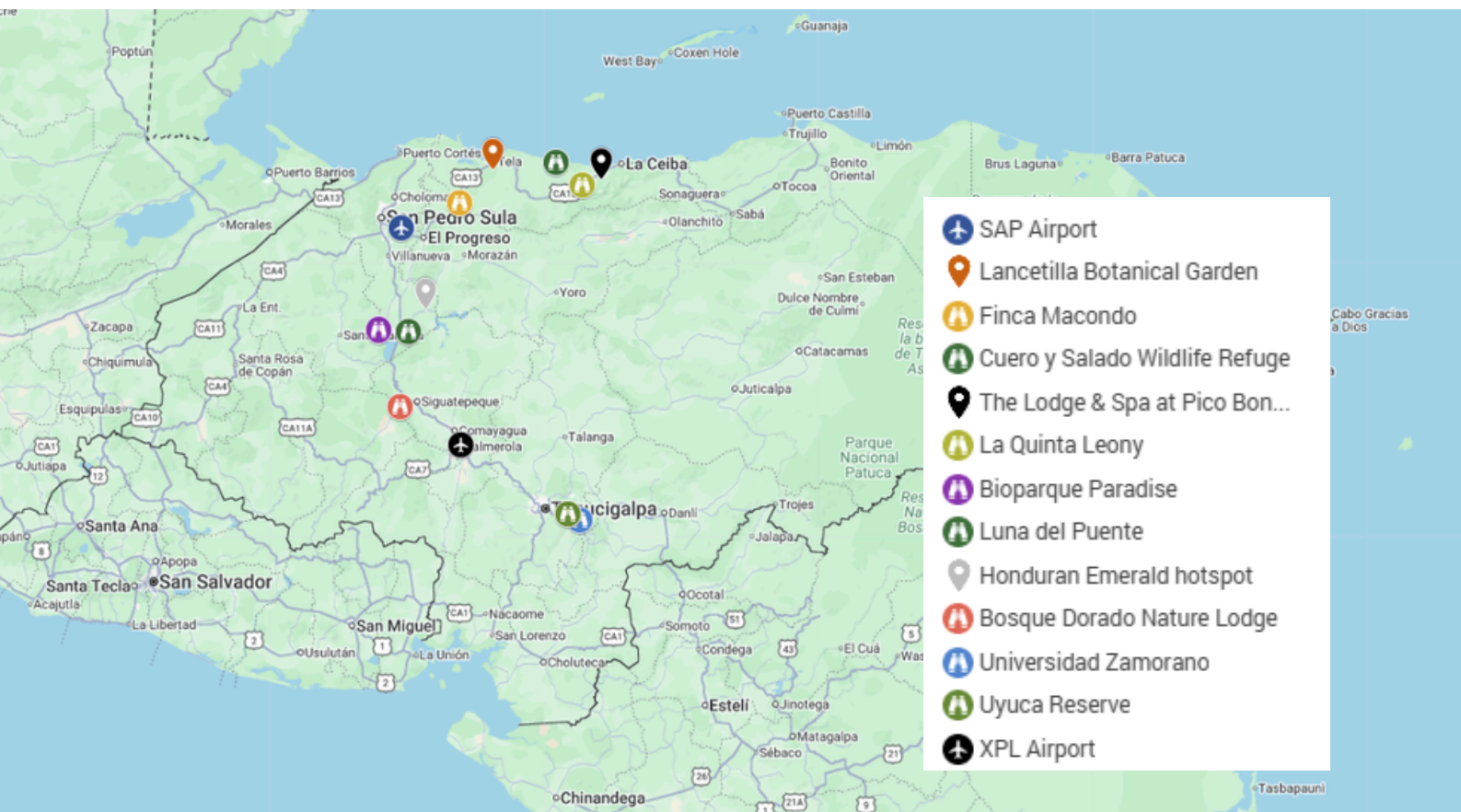

ITINERARY

10 days - Aves Honduras Bird Sanctuary Tour



Nestled in the heart of Mesoamerica, Honduras offers an extraordinary mosaic of ecosystems that make it a great destination for birdwatching. From coastal mangroves and tropical rainforests to cloud forests and pine-oak highlands, the country harbors nearly 800 bird species, including residents, regional endemics, and migratory marvels. Its compact geography allows birders to experience dramatic ecological transitions within a single itinerary.

Over the course of 10 days, we will explore 7 established Aves Honduras sanctuaries. Each visit offers the chance to walk their trails, observe local biodiversity, and learn firsthand about their conservation efforts, visions, and the unique stories behind each sanctuary. Along the way, we will also discover how biodiversity, agriculture, local production, and community-based tourism are interconnected through experiences such as meeting the women of AMALANCETILLA, exploring cacao and chocolate production at Luna del Puente, and experiencing other local initiatives that add depth and meaning to our journey.

So, let's prepare your binoculars and cameras—and get ready to discover Honduras beyond its birds.

DAY 1:

Our tour leader will be waiting for you at the airport with a sign from Aves Honduras. Transfer to hotel. We will have a general presentation of Honduras.

DAY 2:

By the morning we will bird at Finca Macondo, a sanctuary that exemplifies its owners' deep commitment to sustainability. Through regenerative agricultural practices, including the cultivation of cacao, rambutan, and mangosteen, and the responsible transformation of African palm plantations, they promote a lifestyle rooted in harmony with nature and long-term ecological stewardship.

After lunch, we will visit the Lancetilla Botanical Garden, considered as the largest tropical botanical garden in the Americas, due to the number of trees with commercial importance. It is hotspot #3 in the country.

We will have the opportunity to learn about AMALANCETILLA AMALANCETILLA is a women-led community enterprise producing jams, marmalades, and fruit wines from locally sourced fruits.

DAY 3:

This day, we will head to the Cuero y Salado Wildlife Refuge to enjoy its natural beauty and navigate through mangrove channels, while we bird by boat as we immerse ourselves in this unique coastal ecosystem.

In the afternoon, we'll visit the Quinta Leony. Located in the buffer zone of Pico Bonito National Park, this sanctuary offers biodiversity very similar to that of the national park.

DAY 4:

We'll explore the trails before and after breakfast at the Lodge at Pico Bonito. This site is the country's #1 hotspot. This potential bird sanctuary is surrounded by lush rainforest and serves as a gateway to one of Honduras' richest biodiversity hotspots.

DAY 5:

After breakfast, we will head to the central region of the country, to Lake Yojoa. A boat tour by the lake, await us. In the afternoon, we will visit Bioparque Paradise, a sanctuary but as a private nature reserve, located between two protected areas, Azul Meámbar NP and Montaña de Santa Bárbara NP. This sanctuary is a biological connection site, serving as a refuge for mammals, amphibians, reptiles, and birds.

DAY 6:

We continue exploring the Lake Yojoa region. Today we will visit two spectacular sites. First, we will meet our only endemic bird, the Honduran Emerald.

In the afternoon, we will explore PANACAM Lodge, located within Azul Meámbar National Park, a spectacular cloud forest ecosystem.

DAY 7:

This day we will visit Luna del Puente, one of the country's leading bird sanctuaries and a charming working farm that produces cacao, coffee, cardamom, and achiote.

You will have time to explore the birding blind, canopy tower, and scenic trails throughout the property. In addition, you will learn about the cacao production process—from bean to bar—and even craft your own handmade chocolate bar.

DAY 8:

It's time to visit our final sanctuary of the trip. In the morning, we will explore Bosque Dorado Nature Lodge.

This reserve is located at 1,400 meters above sea level on the edge of the Montecillos Biological Reserve and is surrounded by coffee plantations. Approximately 200 bird species have been recorded here. Here we will have also the opportunity to talk with coffee producer.

Later, we will transfer to Zamorano University for our overnight stay and additional birding around the campus. Before dinner, we will attend a presentation by Aves Honduras, led by board members and staff.

DAY 9:

This morning we will visit Uyuca Biological Reserve, a protected cloud forest co-managed by Zamorano University. The reserve safeguards highland ecosystems rich in biodiversity and serves as a living laboratory for research, conservation, and environmental education. We will have a talk with eBird reviewer about the importance of citizen science.

In the afternoon, after lunch, we will transfer to Siguatepeque or Comayagua for our overnight stay, positioning ourselves conveniently near the airport for departure.

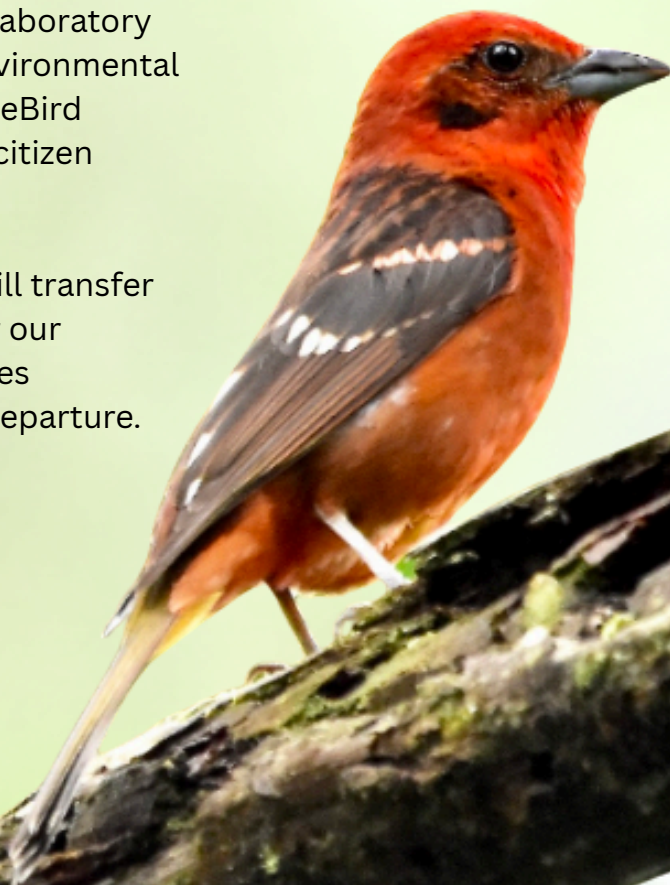
DAY 10:

Weather Conditions

Throughout our journey across Honduras' key birding destinations, we'll encounter a rich diversity of microclimates that enhance the country's avian biodiversity.

- In **Tela**, located on the Caribbean coast, expect warm and humid conditions year-round, with temperatures ranging from 68°F to 86°F (20°C to 30°C).
- In **El Pino**, near Pico Bonito National Park, the climate is slightly cooler due to elevation and forest cover, with temperatures typically between 64°F and 86°F (18°C to 30°C).
- At **Lake Yojoa**, especially in Los Naranjos, mornings are fresh and afternoons warm, with a range of 62°F to 90°F (17°C to 32°C).
- In the **Yegua Valley**, home to Zamorano, the subtropical climate offers pleasant conditions, with temperatures from 63°F to 88°F (17°C to 31°C).
- Finally, in **El Rincón, Siguatepeque**, nestled in pine-oak highlands, expect cooler mornings and mild afternoons, with a range of 59°F to 82°F (15°C to 28°C).

This climatic variety not only supports a wide range of bird species—from coastal migrants to highland endemics—but also ensures a comfortable and stimulating experience for birdwatchers.

Recommendations

- Airport suggested: San Pedro Sula (SAP).
- Select flights to arrive before or at noon.
- Purchase travel insurance in your country that covers all eventualities during your stay.
- Come prepared. Consider packing hiking boots and a jacket in case of rain or a shower.
- Since this is a tropical country, bring your favorite insect repellent and wear long-sleeved, lightweight, and cool shirts.
- We encourage and respect the principles of sustainable tourism. Therefore, we avoid purchasing plastic bottles. Bring your own water bottle to refill, which will be available throughout the trip.
- To enter Honduras, the most important vaccination requirement is currently yellow fever for travelers who have visited countries with a risk of transmission, such as African and South American countries, within the last 12 months. Recently, a measles vaccination requirement was added for travelers arriving from countries with active outbreaks. However, we recommend checking with your airline. They have the most up-to-date information.
- If you bring cash in dollars, for tips or other purchases, make sure that they are not torn, stained, or damaged.
