HCCI Centers of Excellence


To address the shortage of professionals trained in home-based primary care delivery, HCCI has created an engaging curriculum designed to help primary care providers work efficiently and effectively in a home setting. We are also embarking on an outreach campaign to advance HBPC as a trailblazing career option for medical providers and as the standard of care delivery for treating complex, chronically ill patients.

Our curriculum results from the work of a nation-wide team of experts in the field of house call medicine, brought to life through interactive case-based instructional design.

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HCCI has created a nationwide network of Centers of Excellence (COEs) and Practice Excellence Partners (PEPs), which provide the first and only comprehensive home-based primary care curriculum in the U.S.

The intent is to help learners develop critical thinking skills around the guiding principles of home-based primary care. Intended to inspire true learning, this 2-day, 12-hour course will present learners with both a clinical and practice management perspective.

The clinical teachings include the unique requirements of a care plan for treating patients in homes or other non-acute settings, and dealing with emergent situations. The practice

management portion will guide professionals toward building a sustainable practice model that meets the needs of their organization and the community it serves.

A shift to home-delivered primary care isn't just about learning new skills. Professionals are exploring an entirely new avenue of health care delivery and must shift attitudes, points of view, technologies, perspectives, and paradigms about health care. This is not a passive, Power Point lecture. Instead, participants are expected to dig in and solve problems, learning the tools they need for delivering optimal home-based care. We believe that the best way to gain knowledge is through participatory learning methods, so the operative part of our workshop is "work." The real learning comes when participants are asked to reflect on the observations they've made.



We will host a facilitator training in September for instructors from our eight [HCCI Centers of Excellence](#). We are confident that as each participant takes the curriculum and facilitation methods back to their center, we will reach more physicians and Advanced Practice primary care professionals, expanding the field exponentially.
