### Provenance

Materials originally donated by Marbury L. Councell, (n.d.) but were dispersed into various files and collections over the years.

### Biography

Marbury Layton Councell was born in Baltimore, Maryland on January 26, 1894 to Rhodes Hemmons and Elizabeth White Councell. He attended Baltimore public schools through the fourth grade, and entered McDonogh School on October 9, 1905, as student "no. 1117." The November 13, 1905 minutes of the Board of Trustees note that the Committee on Education reported that Councell was one of the "boys...appointed to fill vacancies."

During his five years at McDonogh, he served as a Third Sergeant in Company B, played baseball and football, was a member of the Glee Club, and was in the chorus in the musical, *Pinafore*, in 1908. Upon graduation in 1910, he took a job as a clerk with the Baltimore and Ohio Railroad, and stayed there until taking a position at the banking and brokerage offices of Poe & Davies in Baltimore in 1917. He was also a member of the McDonogh Alumni Football Club.

In January 1918 he applied for admission to the Aviation Section, U. S. Signal Corps. and was sworn in that same month – one of only four out of 20 in his class that passed the examination. While waiting for his orders, he took a "six-week class for flyers...in preliminary ground work" at Johns Hopkins University. After 12 weeks of training at the School of Military Aeronautics at Cornell University, he was ordered to Camp Dick in Dallas, Texas, where he volunteered to train as a bomber pilot. He continued his training at Ellington Field, Houston, Texas, and was commissioned a 2<sup>nd</sup> Lieutenant that December. Since the War had effectively ended the previous month, he was honorably discharged on the same day he was commissioned and put on the reserve list.

In 1920, he took a job as a salesman for W. B. Cassell Company in Baltimore where he stayed for 35 years. In September 1922, Councell married Annie Elizabeth Stevens and together they had two sons, Marbury and Thomas. When World War II began, he was called back into service as a Major, and reported for duty to Pope Field at Fort Bragg, North Carolina, as Supervisor of Services until the end of the War. He retired January 1, 1959, and died November 27, 1987.

## **Scope & Content Notes**

The strength of this small collection are Councell's informative and often entertaining letters written in 1918, first while studying at the U. S. Army School of Military Aeronautics at Cornell University, and then while stationed at Camp Dick, Dallas, Texas, and Ellington Field in Houston, Texas. In them, he details his schooling at Cornell, his travel by train to Camp Dick via Buffalo, Indianapolis, St. Louis and "other small towns in Kansas and Oklahoma", and, his training as a bomber pilot while stationed at Ellington Field; "Bombs have been dropping so fast[,] the grass has caught fire and the fire dept[.] is on the job." He writes often of the activities of daily camp life, the weather, "If the place below is any hotter than it is here it would pay one to be good", he quips in a letter from August 4, 1918, and frequently mentioned McDonogh classmates he has seen or has news of, as well as requests *The Week* to be sent to him.

While this collection only contains 15 of the original letters Councell wrote to Duncan C. Lyle, many more of them were published in *The Week* and can be read here: **VFM-14: Councell, Marbury L. Class of 1910. Lyle Scrapbook.**
