UNF Poll: Support for Property Tax amendment hinges on contested ballot language

Donalds, Moody maintain single digit leads in November governor, senate races

Jacksonville, Fla. —A new poll of likely midterm election voters in Florida from the Public Opinion Research Lab (PORL) at the University of North Florida shows Byron Donalds in a five-point lead in the race for Florida Governor. Respondents were also asked about their approval of several elected officials, as well as existing and proposed policies.

When asked who they would vote for in the 2026 Florida governor's election if the candidates were Republican Byron Donalds and Democrat David Jolly, 46% of respondents indicated a vote for Donalds, 41% for Jolly, 5% said someone else, 2% said they wouldn't vote, and 6% were undecided.

Regarding the race for U.S. Senator from Florida, 50% of respondents indicated a vote for Republican incumbent Ashley Moody when matched up with both Democrats Alexander Vindman and Angie Nixon. Moody has a 10-point lead on Vindman (40%), with 1% saying they'd vote for someone else, 1% who wouldn't vote, and 7% undecided. Nixon (42%) is eight percentage points behind Moody, with 1% someone else, 1% wouldn't vote, and 6% undecided.

"These races are notably closer than we've seen in recent election cycles, somewhat unsurprising given that the party that controls the presidency usually struggles in midterm elections," said PORL's faculty director, Dr. Sean Freeder. "Despite very different ideological approaches, the two Democratic Senate candidates do about as well as one another, suggesting the party's internal debate over whether to move left or stay centrist may not much affect the behavior of voters, or at least that they aren't paying attention yet."

Respondents were also asked about President Trump's job approval, as well as three likely candidates for the 2028 Republican presidential primary: Ron DeSantis, Marco Rubio, and JD Vance. Trump had the lowest overall approval of the four, with 48% saying they approve either strongly or somewhat, and 51% disapproving, with 46% strong disapproval. JD Vance received similar approval, with 49% saying they approve strongly or somewhat, and 48% who disapprove. Among registered Republicans, 18% said they either strongly or somewhat disapprove of Trump, and 14% disapprove of Vance. Both Trump and Vance are underwater among independents, with disapproval at 55% and 51%, respectively.

DeSantis and Rubio fared relatively better, with DeSantis receiving 57% approval and 41% disapproval. Similarly, Rubio's approval came in at 56%, with 42% disapproving. Both officials did well among their Republican base and are solidly above water among independents.

"Though it's early, Vance's low support relative to Rubio and DeSantis suggests his proximity to Trump may become a problem for him in the 2028 Presidential Primary," added Dr. Freeder.

When it comes to Trump's foreign policy, 45% of respondents said they approve either strongly or somewhat, and 53% expressed disapproval. When asked about Trump's speech, personality, and demeanor, approval was notably lower, with 39% saying they approve strongly or somewhat. About half

(49%) of the entire sample said they *strongly* disapprove of Trump's demeanor, and another 11% somewhat disapprove, for a total of 60% disapproval.

Additionally, respondents were asked what they think was the cause of the recent algae problem in the Reflecting Pool in Washington DC, following its renovation. Forty-two percent said the issues are due to a poorly handled renovation; 25% said vandalism was to blame, and 18% said it was due to natural or scientific processes. Three percent indicated something else.

"Unsurprisingly, perceptions of the pool issue vary greatly by party," commented Dr. Freeder. "That said, less than a majority (45%) of Florida Republicans accept Trump's explanation of vandalism, and only 18% of Independents said the same."

Respondents were also asked what issues specifically relating to affordability should be the Florida government's first priority. Responses were fairly evenly distributed, with 23% indicating inflation, 21% each for housing costs and property taxes, 20% saying property insurance, and 10% low wages. Three percent said something else. Democrats were likelier to cite inflation (26%), housing costs (32%), and low wages (20%) as a top concern, while Republicans were more focused on property taxes (32%) and property insurance (25%).

Respondents were then asked about the proposed amendment to the Florida State Constitution that would begin to phase out taxes on homestead property, other than those directed to schools. Respondents were first told it would require local governments to use property taxes only for core public services. A total of 61% indicated support for the amendment (strongly or somewhat), while 32% expressed opposition. In a follow-up question, respondents were told that estimates suggest passage of the amendment would lead to a municipal budget shortfall of about \$11.8 billion over two years. When asked again with this additional information, overall support for the amendment dropped by 16 percentage points to 45%, with 47% opposing.

"These numbers show how important the final ballot language will be in determining the outcome of this amendment," said Dr. Freeder. "When told about the budget impact, likely voters decisively reject the amendment. Without that language, the subject of an ongoing lawsuit, it just barely exceeds the 60% threshold required for adoption."

Finally, respondents were asked their opinions about artificial intelligence (AI) and data centers. The general increase in use of AI over the past year received split support and opposition among respondents, with 49% in each category. Partisans clearly differ, as 60% of Republicans showed support, compared to just 32% of Democrats. When it comes to data centers, however, just 28% of Floridians said they would support building an AI data center in their local area, with 68% saying they would oppose.

"While Floridians are evenly split on their impressions of AI, opposition to the building of data centers is overwhelming. Even groups who are positive about the technology don't want its support infrastructure anywhere near where they live," commented Freeder.

Methodology

The UNF PORL Florida Statewide Poll consists of a random sample of 848 likely Florida midterm voters, and was conducted from July 8 through 17, 2026, by the Public Opinion Research Lab (PORL) at the University of North Florida. This poll used a mixed-mode design, incorporating both telephone interviews and web surveys distributed via text message. Of the likely midterm voters who completed surveys, 459 were completed via telephone, and 389 online. The sampling frame, consisting of phone numbers, was sourced from the June 2026 update of the Florida voter file. A voter was considered "likely" if they voted in at least one of the 2020, 2022, or 2024 general elections. A proportional number of new registrants

were also included in the sampling frame. Respondents who said they would “probably not” or “definitely not” vote in the 2026 midterm election were screened out of the survey. To ensure a representative sample, the 10 Florida designated media market areas (DMAs) were stratified by geography and urbanicity into 18 different strata, with Miami-Dade County separated into its own stratum due to its unique population. Surveys were conducted in English and Spanish.

Respondents were contacted by live interviewers via telephone and text message between 5 to 9 p.m. Monday through Friday and 1 to 5 p.m. Saturday, with up to three callbacks attempted. Telephone data collection took place at the PORL facility with its 40-station Computer Assisted Telephone Interviewing (CATI) system. Web respondents were sent a text message with a unique link to take the survey a web-based survey platform. For both text and phone distributions, a single interviewer, through hand dialing, asked for the listed voter by name. If they reached the wrong person, or if the listed voter was not available, the interview was terminated. The response rate of this study was 4.5%, using the American Association of Public Opinion Research (AAPOR) Response Rate 3 (RR3) calculation.

All data are weighted in two steps: first by educational attainment, and then by partisan registration, age, race and ethnicity, sex, and geography to match the population of voters in the 2022 general midterm election. Geographical strata, party registration, sex, race and ethnicity, and age weights were calculated using their respective proportions in Florida Voter File, and vote choice was calculated using election result data from the Florida Division of Elections. Education weights were calculated using the Census Bureau’s American Community Survey (ACS) 2023 five-year estimates for individuals 25 years of age and over, with those under 25 receiving an education weight of one. All weights are calculated and applied using the SPSS version 30 rake weighting function, and assigned a weight of one if any weighting variables are missing. The overall margin of sampling error is +/-3.8 percentage points, including estimated design effect due to weighting. Estimates for smaller subpopulations have greater margins of error, indicating greater uncertainty in the data. It is important to note that sampling error is just one of many potential sources of error. This and all other public opinion research are susceptible to unmeasured, real-world error. The research presented in this release was self-funded by PORL.
