



New York State Economic Development Council Releases New Report Highlighting Massive Economic and Community Impact of IDA Investments

Return on Investment on 2022 IDA Supported Projects Are Transformative:

Over 1.2 Million Jobs Created

Over \$12 Billion in New State Tax Revenue

Albany, NY (March 17, 2025) – The New York State Economic Development Council (NYSEDC) today announced findings from a comprehensive report, which underscores the substantial economic and societal contributions of Industrial Development Agency (IDA) investment across the state. The NYSEDC completes an annual report that tracks the impact of IDAs across the state. These agencies create jobs, attract private investment, build housing, support clean energy projects, and revitalize downtowns. As communities evolve, IDAs have expanded their role from core industrial support to include broader economic development to better align with NYS community priorities. Traditional metrics like job creation and investment numbers tell only part of the story. While these measurements help quantify the direct economic benefits, they miss many valuable IDA contributions that don't generate immediate jobs or fit standard evaluation models. To capture these additional benefits, Camoin Associates and NYSEDC surveyed 80 IDAs in 2024, examining their work in housing, clean energy, and downtown development.

Analysis of IDA projects shows a dramatic economic impact by creating over 1.2 million jobs, \$133.6 billion in earnings and salaries, delivering over \$12 billion in new tax revenue, and \$423.5 billion in annual sales. The benefits are clear: for every \$1 of exemptions issued in 2022, IDA projects returned \$6.20 in new annual tax revenue, generating significant economic benefits across the state.

Other key findings regarding 2022 IDA projects include:

- The creation of 9,700 temporary construction jobs that paid \$895 million in earnings/wages
- \$348 million in new tax revenue via PILOT payments to schools
- 119 projects with a residential component
- The approval of 131 projects located in downtown corridors
- 64 renewable energy projects

Key findings from multiple-year analysis (2020-2024) of IDA activity:

- 378 projects with a residential component
- These projects will create over **31,496 new housing units**, including **9,746 affordable units**
- Support for 322 renewable energy projects



- These projects will generate **6,178 megawatts (MW)** of renewable energy—enough to power over **2.4 million homes statewide**
- **393 projects** located in downtown corridors

“Economic development is more crucial than ever as we navigate a rapidly evolving economy,” **said Ryan Silva, Executive Director of the New York State Economic Development Council.** “This report demonstrates the incredible value IDAs bring to our state—not only in terms of jobs and salaries but also in revitalizing neighborhoods, supporting downtown revitalization, removing blight, advancing clean energy goals, and addressing our housing crisis. IDAs play a pivotal role in creating economic opportunities for all New Yorkers, and this data highlights why modernizing our reporting systems to fully capture their impact is essential.”

A traditional economic impact analysis was conducted *by Camoin Associates* to quantify the impact of IDA projects, which was complemented by the collection of additional metrics through a survey of IDAs. 2022 project data, the most recently available data from PARIS and the New York State Comptroller, were used as key inputs in this analysis.

“IDAs throughout New York continue to show their value by addressing the critical needs of the regions they serve throughout the state. The job creation and economic growth they help to secure through their efforts of attracting and securing private sector employers contribute greatly to the state and local economies. This study illustrates just how significant their investments are to the state and the overall breadth and depth of the positive impacts achieved through all IDA-supported investments,” **said Heather Mulligan, President and CEO, The Business Council of New York State.**
