December 27 — Packer Game Ticket Scanning

Saturday, December 27: arrive by 4:00 p.m. (shift lasts 3½-4½ hours)

Hand of Hope seeks volunteer groups to scan Packers vs. Ravens game tickets (individuals must be age 16 or older). You'll check in with the group coordinator at the designated time and sign in, then be directed to the Usher Room to pick up water and a red polo/jacket to wear over your shirt and walk to your assigned gate(s). PMI staff/volunteer group coordinators can provide directions. They try to keep groups together, but it's possible you may be separated. A gate supervisor will provide training and place volunteers at select locations in the corrals. Volunteers MUST make sure that every guest has a ticket to enter the stadium. Lambeau Field is 100% mobile ticketing; there are self-scanning pedestals at all gates. Ticket issues can be handled by the ticketing agent at each gate. Gate supervisors are there to help. Volunteers are asked to say, "Welcome to Lambeau Field!", thank fans for coming, and be engaged in the fun, while remaining confident in their job duties. Volunteers must wear tan or black pants (no shorts, no capris). Any shirt is fine as PMI will provide a shirt/jacket to wear over your shirt. You'll also be provided with ponchos and handwarmers and will be standing your entire shift.
