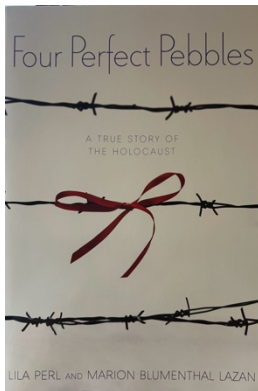


## My 2024 DKG International Convention Experience
