### Afghani Relief Update

Last December, we reported that Session had authorized submission of Humanitarian Parole applications on behalf of an Afghani refugee family of six who remain stuck in Kabul and, essentially, are living in conditions equivalent to self-imposed house arrest out of concern for their safety. Despite the best efforts of their immigration attorney, this family cannot leave until they have secured visas for their two youngest daughters and that process is arduous and protracted. As a result, we have no idea when

this family will begin its journey out of Afghanistan to Cleveland. In the meantime, our rental storage unit is brimming with useable furniture, household items and clothing that could help Afghan families who HAVE made it to Cleveland. At this month's Ministry of Service meeting, a decision was reached to contact the organizations who are working with Afghani families who have already resettled in Cleveland to find out what their needs are and see if any of our donated items fit them. We are fully confident in the generosity of this congregation and trust that, once we know when our sponsored family will be arriving in Cleveland, additional donations will be forthcoming. In the meantime, we will also reach out to our informal network of fellow Presbyterian churches for assistance with readying these items for donation. We ask that you hold our sponsored family in your prayers as they continue to endure grave danger and uncertainty.
