

Elections for Vestry members and Diocesan Council Delegates are conducted in accordance with the canons of the Diocese.

Vestry members elected each year serve for a three-year period and may not succeed themselves for a year. Both those to be elected and those eligible to vote must be at least 16 years of age and must have been confirmed by a Bishop in the Episcopal Church or received into the Episcopal Church from another communion. Both electors and nominees must be enrolled on the parish register and must be confirmed communicants in good standing. This means that they must have received Holy Communion at least three times during the preceding year, must contribute financially, and must be active in the church. The National Canons provide that the Vestry is the agent and legal representative of the parish in all matters

concerning its corporate property and the relations of the parish to its Clergy.

Diocesan Canons specify that the Vestry shall supply any vacancy in the Rectorship of the Parish, administer the temporal concerns of the Church on the Parish, provide for the prompt payment of liabilities, maintain order during divine services, and “in general assist the minister in carrying on the work of the Church in the Parish in all things appropriate.” Diocesan Canons also require that all Vestry members subscribe to the following declaration:

“I am persuaded that the Holy Scripture contains all doctrine required as necessary for eternal salvation through faith in Jesus Christ; and I accede to the doctrine, discipline and worship of the Protestant Episcopal Church.”

The role of the Finance Committee is to work with the Vestry and financial staff to provide financial oversight for the church. This includes budgeting and financial planning, financial reporting and

the creation and monitoring of internal controls and accounting policies. The church's books are audited each year by independent Certified Public Accountants.

Cash in the Church's operating accounts totaled \$289,023.

Total Revenue during the year end December 31, 2022 was \$811,077. Operating Expenses were \$792,821 resulting in Net Operating Margin of \$18,256.

Prepaid 2023 pledges of \$133,907 were received during 2022.

The 2023 annual budget, prepared by the committee working closely with Camille Haglund, Finance Director, was approved by the Vestry.

During the year Trinity Episcopal Church implemented two changes to its business practices to be fully compliant with the Cannons of the Church as stated in the Manual of Business Methods in Church Affairs.

These changes were recommended by the Finance Committee and approved by the Vestry:

1. At the request of the Rev. Abbott, a formal policy for the handling of rector discretionary funds was implemented.

2. The ownership and control of two informal bank accounts, one for ECW and one for Cookbook sales, was changed to the church, making them subject to the same policies and insurance coverage as all existing accounts.

The church's financials are available for review by members of the parish in the church office. We welcome anyone who is interested in the church's finances to attend the Finance Committee's monthly meetings. We meet each month on the third Tuesday.

JUNIOR WARDEN'S REPORT

Tom Wimbrow, Jr.

Total repair and maintenance expenses for 2022 came in somewhat above the budgeted amount primarily due to a couple of water line leaks which required fairly expensive repairs. Other maintenance expenses were in line with expectations and budgeted amounts and overall Trinity facilities are in generally good condition.

We have experienced another apparent significant water line leak in early January and hopefully it will have been repaired before the annual meeting. Our underground water supply pipes are old and subject to deterioration so we will need to assess if at some point replacement of sections of pipe or perhaps entire lines will be more cost effective than individual repairs in the long run.

We had a survey performed of the condition of the various building roof areas and fortunately they are in generally good condition, but there are some areas of the Sanctuary and west of the vesting

room stairway that need relatively minor repairs to correct leaks that will cause moisture problems and structural damage if not addressed. Those repairs should be a priority for 2023.

A service contract was initiated in 2022 to perform regular checks and preventative maintenance on the air conditioning and air handling units to keep them performing at maximum efficiency and prevent minor issues from becoming major expenses. Previous modifications to the HVAC system have been effective in reducing the humidity levels in the Sanctuary that are causing the problems with the plaster on the walls, but work to reduce water ingress is needed to achieve humidity control sufficient to allow permanent repair of the plaster. The Building Committee is working with expert consultants to develop plans for the needed work.

SENIOR WARDEN'S REPORT

As your retiring Senior Warden, I would like to report that the state of Trinity Episcopal Church is good. My tasks this past year have been very easy, thanks in great part to the outstanding leadership from our Rector, the Reverend Jimmy Abbott.

First of all, I would like to mention and thank the members of the Vestry who donated their time to reviewing and running Trinity. Those dedicated parishioners included: Bart Adriance, Bill Ansell, Sally Byrom, Susan Duif, Laura Hughes, Jerry Jackson, Bill Leopold, Linda Macdonald, Theron Pfeifer, Tammie Taylor, and Tom Wimbrow. Tom Wimbrow at the beginning of the year was requested to continue his position as Junior Warden and Bart Adriance gracefully accepted the position as Vestry representative to the Trinity School Board of Trustees, and Tammie Taylor accepted the position of Vestry Secretary. I would also like

to express my appreciation for the continued work of our Treasurer, John Speich.

Highlights

Allow me to review a few highlights of the year for the Vestry. In January the Vestry oversaw the retirement of Danielle Alvarado from many years of guiding the Children's Ministry for which we expressed our deepest gratitude. The Vestry also began planning for our Lenten and Easter Programs as well as preparing for our first in-person Vestry Retreat/Workshop in a number of years.

In February, Trinity was well represented at Diocesan Council by myself, Laura Hughes, and John and Kathy VanDewalli. In February, hoping for a Curate we interviewed several wonderful candidates, but were then disappointed by the Diocesan decision to send them elsewhere. Not

to be stymied, Jimmy and the Vestry decided to rearrange the money available for that position to hire a new Children's Ministry person and a Newcomers Welcoming person. We were blessed then by Catie Totty's acceptance of the position and have been wonderfully impressed with her ministry.

In March the Vestry Retreat did occur on a Saturday and new goals and directions were discussed. As has been the desire for many years, the focus was on how to recruit younger members, develop meaningful outreach to the community, and minister to the needs of our youth. Following a wonderful and well attended Holy Season of events, the Vestry attended to a number of housekeeping issues.

In June the Vestry met in my home while Jimmy was away and we had a wonderful time of fellowship and getting some real work done (just kidding). During June, Catie Totty also took over duties as Lay Minister Coordinator, and again is doing a smashing job. As well, Catie hosted the Trinity Vacation Bible School and recorded a record 97 enrollees.

In July, Jimmy informed the Vestry of the coming gift of the St. John's Bible and in August Jimmy and several other members of the parish traveled to Minnesota for a briefing on the Bible.

In September the St. John's Bible arrived and planning for a docent training session began. Also, in September the Vestry was alerted to some of the issues brought forward by a rejuvenated Building Committee and an architect's input was solicited.

Our October–November meeting saw the beginnings of planning for Advent and Christmas and the issue of resurrecting a William Temple Board of Trustees was brought forward. And we were blessed with the placement of Deacon candidate Charlie Stiernberg. A nominating committee was convened in November with the intent of formulating a ballot of new Vestry members. The goal of that committee to recruit "relatively" young and enthusiastic members has

been achieved and awaits the Parish's approval. December saw the Vestry's continued attention being brought to Building Committee issues and an approval of the coming year's budget.

So, thanks be to God, your Vestry has not had to deal with any major catastrophes over the last year, but I do believe we have made steady progress in addressing the day-to-day running of the Church and are beginning to plan for a very exciting refurbishing and refreshment of the Church's physical plant.

I pray that as the Vestry and Church go forward, we will do so with the commitment to continue to restore and maintain the physical aspects of the Church with the intent to provide a place to address, promote and minister to the spiritual needs of our immediate parishioners and the community at large. I cannot thank the Reverend Jimmy, members of the Vestry, the administrative staff, and the parishioners for making this year very easy for your Senior Warden. Please know that all of you who show up for worship on Sundays, playing what you may feel are minor roles as lector, worship leader or lay eucharistic ministers, ushers, or the individual parishioner worshiping in the pews, you are vital parts of this Body of Christ.

Allow me to close with a blessing from noted Irish poet, priest, and Celtic scholar John O'Donohue (To Bless the Space Between Us, Doubleday Publishing Group. 2008, p.158):

**As this year draws to its end,
We give thanks for the gifts it brought,
And how they became inlaid within,
Where neither time nor tide can touch them.**

**We bless this year for all we learned,
For all we loved and lost,
And for the quiet way it brought us,
Nearer to our invisible destination.**

Day by day I thank God for this ministry entrusted to me. Serving as your rector is a great joy and blessing. While 2022 was not without its challenges and difficulties, I saw our parish thrive and grow in many ways.

Worship

Sunday worship services are the heart of our life together at Trinity. Not only did our worship services grow over the course of the past year, but the ministries who assist with worship also grew (Ushers, Altar Guild, Choir, Acolytes, Lectors, and Eucharistic Ministers). A number of factors contributed to this, I believe. First, the COVID-19 pandemic has been easing, and gathering in groups has become much safer. Second, we have seen a number of people visit and join Trinity Church upon moving to Galveston.

Staff Transitions

In the first quarter of 2022, Danielle Alvarado stepped down from her position as Director of Children's Ministries. We are all so grateful for her years of service and dedication to this parish and the children here!

Catie Totty joined our staff in March as Director of Children & Youth Ministries. Her joy, enthusiasm, and commitment is infectious. In the fall of last year, 25% of the congregation at the 10:30 a.m. worship service was below the age of 18. Plus, we had over 90 children attend our summer Vacation Bible School. Along with all the volunteers, Catie is helping our children grow in faith. Last year I had hoped that we would call a curate, or assistant priest, to serve at Trinity. Since that did not happen, the Vestry amended the budget to fit some other staff needs. Along those lines, Catie also took on the role of Lay Ministry Coordinator. This means that she schedules the Sunday worship ministers and assists with pastoral care.

Marie Kidd served as the Interim Head of School for all of 2022. Along with Trinity Church members Sally Byrom and Pat Adams, I served on the Search Committee for a new Head of School. By unanimous vote of the Board of Trustees, Mark Fallo was called and accepted the position. His tenure will begin on July 1, 2023.

The Saint John's Bible

Thanks to the loving generosity of certain donors, Trinity Episcopal Church received the gift of a Heritage Edition of The Saint John's Bible in 2022. Already this incredible gift has shaped the spirituality of our congregation. Volumes are not only available to see on Sunday mornings during worship and Adult Sunday school, but they are available for parishioners throughout the week. This is a wonderful gift and will continue to inspire all of us for years and generations to come!

Mission & Ministry

Starting last September, we began a new Wednesday night program in conjunction with the William Temple Center. Our time together consists of Evening Prayer, a shared meal, and Bible Study. I want to thank all the volunteers who cook and clean for these meals. The gifts of service they provide make our times of spiritual growth and connection possible!

The Outreach Committee has also done a tremendous job of recruiting our parishioners to volunteer at St. Vincent's House. Personally, I was so glad that the Outreach Committee asked us to help at Thanksgiving - I truly enjoyed the day I spent delivering Thanksgiving groceries around Galveston.

Charlie Stiernberg, our deacon-in-training, has also been a great asset. He spearheaded the Christmas boxes for the Seafarers' Ministry. Plus, through the Outreach Committee, he will be going to visit the Episcopal Diocese of Costa Rica this February so that he can help our church foster a relationship with the church there.

Finances

As you can see in this annual report, Trinity remains in strong financial shape. Your generosity is our single greatest asset, and on behalf of the Vestry and Finance Committee, I want to thank you for your support. Beyond that, Trinity received a number of large, unexpected gifts. The Vestry has allotted these gifts for some future capital work at Trinity. Plus, last spring we hosted our first Legacy Society dinner. The Legacy Society is composed of any person who has designated Trinity as a

beneficiary in their will, trust, or estate. These gifts have helped augment our annual budget and provide for the life-giving ministry we now enjoy.

Finally, our pledge campaign in the fall of 2022 exceeded our goals and expectations, both in number of pledges and in pledged amount. This abundant harvest will allow our church to continue growing.

Looking Ahead

Last year we did an excellent job of steadily growing and connecting. This is setting us up well for the next chapter in the life of our parish. Personally, my motto for 2023 is "Stepping on the Gas." This resonates with what we expect to happen here in 2023.

With Charlie's help, we will solidify a mission relationship with a church in Costa Rica. Mark Fallo will begin his leadership at Trinity School. Our own staff will grow and expand. And of course, we will have to address the physical needs of the church building. I invite you to join me in stepping on the gas in 2023!

BUILDING COMMITTEE

John Ferguson, Committee Chair

The Building Committee continues to address issues involving the physical properties of historic Trinity Church.

Eaton Hall Doors

Restoration of the front door of Eaton Hall was begun as the year ended, and is nearing completion. In addition, work has begun to clean and update selected ground floor restrooms in Eaton Hall and the Cloister.

Wind and Water Repairs

Damage caused by wind and water remains in the forefront. The committee has sought expert advice from a variety of professionals, and preparations are underway to address roof and masonry leaks. Roof problems should be resolved during the first half of 2023.

Sanctuary Windows

The sanctuary's twelve stained glass windows are in critical condition, and must be removed, and completely restored. Much of the original lead caning has buckled, creating a way for water and humidity to enter the sanctuary. Engineering tests have proved this to be a significant cause of damage to the building.

Another source of water damage is the window frames themselves. Most of the frames have suffered serious rot and must be replaced.

The Building Committee is being aided in all these efforts by Mike Bell, Trinity's new facilities manager. He brings many years of experience with him and will help us make informed recommendations to the vestry.

- Supported the Ronald McDonald house dietary program with funding—especially for the bread for their meals.

- Provided a financial grant to aid the Benjamin Eaton Chapter of the Daughters of King with supplies for their pastoral care blankets and chemo kit projects.
- Aided in the monthly unloading of fresh produce food truck at St. Vincent's House. The food was organized in food boxes for individual families.

The committee remains open to the addition of other projects, and welcomes anyone interested in joining the committee.

Requested budget for Outreach Ministry for 2023 was \$12,000.

Children's Ministry & Communication

We had a very successful year with our Children's Ministry. This year Sunday School for all ages started again, and that included a Sunday School class for kids from 9:30-10:15. Children's Church was held during the 10:30am service and we averaged around 13 kids every Sunday. Some Sundays (not including Easter or Christmas Eve) we had as many as 18 kids. The classes are for children ages 4 years through 5th grade. The children are returned to their families during the Peace.

We are very thankful we have scheduled volunteers and we follow the Safeguarding God's Children's policy which mean we always have at least 2 safeguarded adults with the children. Emails are sent to our church families about upcoming events and projects. Catie also contributes with posts on Facebook and Instagram, as an added means for communication.

Vacation Bible School

VBS returned this year in a weeklong format, and the theme was "Monumental- Celebrating God's Greatness!" This year we partnered with Trinity Episcopal School's summer program and between students from church and the school we had over 90 kids join us for VBS. It was a time of fun, learning, and a lot of music and games. We were thankful for the great participation, and all the volunteers who donated time and materials to make this VBS a great success.

Nursery

For the 10th year we have had a staffed nursery. The nursery was open from 9:00-12:00 on Sunday's and from 5:30-7:30 on Wednesday's during our programs. We welcome families to use the nursery as they feel comfortable. It is equipped for ages newborn through 3 years old.

Children's Church and Sunday School

Children's church underwent several changes this year. In March, we had students from Rice University come and help paint the chapel. We moved the

furniture around, set the altar back up at the front of the room, purchased a rug, and organized all the Godly play materials. Sunday school was taught using Godly Play and for Children's Church we used a children's bulletin. During each class a snack is offered and sometimes a craft.

Youth

This year we started hosting youth group gatherings during our Wednesday evening programs. Before youth group, the group ate dinner with the rest of the congregation and the William Temple Center students. After dinner, we would play a game outside, have a bible study inside, a time for prayer, and end the evening with a card or board game.

The youth also did several projects outside of youth group. They painted a barrel to collect trash at the beach through Artist Boat's annual contest and won first place in their age bracket. The youth also helped with VBS and the Pet Blessings.

Lay Ministry Coordinator

This year the position of Lay Ministry Coordinator was created. The position helps in coordinating pastoral responses to parishioners in need, especially in times of sickness. Meal trains are set up when needed and prayer cards are sent every time a new person is added to our prayer list.

The Lay Ministry Coordinator also schedules and arranges baby showers for members of the congregation as requested, and coordinates anything else that may be needed for our parishioners. The Lay Ministry Coordinator also schedules the Worship Leaders, Lectors, Eucharistic Ministers and Acolytes for each of the services.



Many of the students had not been able to experience the home cooked meals because of COVID restrictions. It was wonderful for them to enjoy regular meals prepared with love by the “Willie T’s” cook team and volunteers. Weekly dinners have been a huge success with the outpouring of volunteers to prepare food and desserts, as well as serving it. Every Wednesday the students are invited to join evening prayer.

The parishioners joined the students for weekly dinners over the Fall semester. There was an option added for the students to join in a Coffee Talk series following dinner. They could also join

the parishioners for their Bible Study.

Willie T’s students and volunteers ran the Jolly Jester Jaunt 5K, with about 35 participants. In addition, we were so very grateful to be able to celebrate the kickoff of weekly dinners with a Willie T’s Welcome Back Wednesday Celebration, with well over 100 in attendance. Willie T’s even had a Bible study with pumpkin carving.

The student study center is open and the students call this their “Home Away from Home!” We keep it stocked with food, internet, printer and supplies. They appreciate the love so much.

Capital expenditures were mainly used to supplement the additional cost of food since the drive-thru dinners cost more than when we prepare the food. Another reason we are glad to be serving in-person meals again.

Other capital expenditures were SAGE Software, and some seasonal décor to make the center more welcoming throughout the holidays.

Outreach expenditures include helping students in need (car repairs, help with rent and food, etc). We are blessed and thankful to minister to young people in the name of the Lord.
